Dear all,

I apologise for the unanswered calls, texts, messages and emails. As you know, Helen refuses to embrace electronic means of communication, so it falls to me to send this email. There is no easy way to say this, but here it is: our darling granddaughter Poppy has been diagnosed with a rare type of brain cancer. We are reeling, devastated, not least because it came completely out of the blue after a routine check-up.

For new members who don't know us: Paige is our daughter, she and her husband Glen have Poppy, who is just two; and James is our son. His wife Olivia is pregnant with twins, which hasn't been straightforward, either.

The last few weeks have been a whirl of tests, scans, meetings, decisions and lots of tears. But tears don't cure cancer. If only. The doctors are in the process of drawing up a treatment plan, while Paige and Helen are sourcing options and opinions from around the world. The Hayward women are made of stern stuff without a doubt.

We have seriously considered cancelling The Fairway Players' production of *All My Sons*, and for a while assumed we would. But now we've had some time to get used to this – our new status as a family living with cancer – we've taken the decision to continue with the play. The doctors have impressed upon us how important it is for the family to maintain a sense of normality and not let this diagnosis take over all our lives, so . . . the show must go on.

I will, however, step down as director. James will direct and I'll assist when I can. Of course Paige will no longer be involved, but – for the moment at least – Helen will continue as Kate Keller. It's a large role, but Helen is blessed with unflagging energy and is keener than ever to stay occupied. She'll need to support Paige and Glen whenever required, so please take the Rehearsal Schedule attached as a work in progress.

It was lovely chatting with you yesterday about your first month at St Ann's and all things Africa. Sadly, my window for humanitarian volunteering

closed about ten years ago, but I can still dream . . .

I know you want to keep it informal, but the issues you raise are very serious and I want to address them here. I will precis as follows:

1. Poor standards of engagement among staff.
2. Lack of perception among staff that family members of the elderly can be as needful of care and understanding as the patient. You cite best practice in Paediatrics as the ideal.
3. A culture of intimidation that precludes staff from addressing the issues above.
4. Incidents of 'bullying' involving one member of staff in particular.

We welcome feedback and guarantee anonymity for anyone who reports unacceptable behaviour by colleagues. If you wish to make a formal complaint re points 1–3 above, I can open the official channels for you.

I have worked at St Ann's for twelve years and will say that Elderly Care has always been subject to a high turnover of staff. It is an unpopular discipline and we find it difficult attracting and keeping experienced colleagues. You are quite right to say patients and their families deserve more engaged care, and Paediatrics is holistic in this respect. Perhaps colleagues more readily engage with the worried parents of vulnerable young children than they do with difficult elderly patients and their stressed middle-aged relatives?

We are working to improve our staff engagement all the time. You'll have seen the CPD notices in the staffroom, plus some minor restructuring in the next six months will place care teams in smaller groups than at present. Hopefully you will see the situation improve.

Re point 4 above. St Ann's has a zero-tolerance approach to bullying and I would say to impress upon this colleague that she can contact her line manager – or my department – at any time. I appreciate that she is non-confrontational, but victims must come forward in person for the correct procedures to be initiated.

Again Sam, thank you for our chat and I look forward to seeing you again next month for your eight-week appraisal.

Dear all,

Again, apologies for unanswered messages and emails. Helen and I are truly humbled by the thoughts, prayers and numerous offers of help we have received. We read and appreciate every message, but it's not possible to reply to them all and give Poppy, Paige and Glen the support they need. We hope you understand.

In the weeks since Poppy's diagnosis, Helen and Paige have been sourcing global research into Medulloblastoma. Last year a pioneering drug therapy was tested at a leading cancer hospital in Massachusetts, USA. In these comprehensive tests one particular drug combination showed significant positive results in the treatment of Poppy's rare type of cancer. These exciting results indicate that its success rate as a cure will far exceed that of the drugs currently used to treat brain cancer in the UK. The trouble is, that experimental phase is over and the drug won't be available here for many years, thanks to the process involved in introducing a new drug therapy to the NHS. We fear this delay will be too late for Poppy. So, we propose to buy a course of treatment from the research-and-development laboratory.

I think I remember you from the medical centre in Mobaye, although it was six years ago. Thank you for your email. I am truly sorry to hear about your friend's granddaughter. Medulloblastoma is usually aggressive and difficult to treat. Hopefully the American drug you mention will prove a positive step. Unfortunately, I have no means of finding out more about it. US R&D is generally funded by commercial operations, so is kept under wraps to protect the company's financial interests. Once it is released on to the US market, they will no doubt approach us about taking it, but I've known drugs take ten years to be approved for NHS use. I have no way of knowing whether the new combination will be effective and haven't heard of any other new treatments aimed specifically at Medulloblastoma in recent years.

Mount More is certain to have the latest available. I am sorry I can't be of any further help, but wish your friends well with their fundraising and you with your half-marathon.

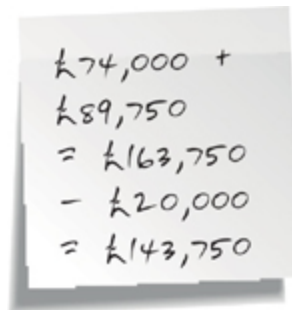

Dear A Cure for Poppy,

My wife and I were greatly moved by Helen Grace-Hayward's speech last night. We would like to donate £500 to the 'Poppy Appeal' in memory of our daughter.

Belinda was born in 1973, a very happy, energetic and artistic little girl. She was the only one, so she had all our attention, and we had all hers. Unfortunately the wonderful life we thought we had, and barely appreciated at the time, was not to last. Just after her fifth birthday we noticed Belinda's speech becoming slower and her hand movements uncoordinated. She was eventually diagnosed with inoperable Fibrillary Diffuse Astrocytoma, a slow-growing brain cancer. That term was to haunt us. 'Slow-growing' seems preferable to 'aggressive', and yet it only meant she died more slowly. Appalling to experience and to watch. She would endure various treatments over the years. We tried conventional and alternative therapies, but sadly in 1989 at the age of 16, Belinda died.

It seems so cruel to allow someone to live just long enough to appreciate the life they will never experience. She has been dead now for many years longer than she was ever alive. Yet for us time stopped then. Nothing since has had as much meaning as her death. She was robbed of her future and we were robbed of ours. The pain and sadness have scarred us forever. Even our nieces and nephews born since Belinda died consider her death to be something that happened to them. The shockwaves have been felt throughout our family for a generation and more. That is the legacy of tragedy.

The question 'Do you have children?' haunted us from that moment. There is no comfortable answer. If we say 'no' we deny her any existence at all, and in no time we are in a conversation about childlessness that we know nothing about. If we reply 'yes, but our daughter died', it creates a mortifying moment for whoever asked. It is human nature to seek out even a shred of positive in any overwhelming disaster. Over the years, so many people have assured us we are 'lucky' to have had the 'privilege of knowing her', and that is 'better than never having known her at all'. I just nod in response. It wasn't a question, and that isn't my answer.

Just after Belinda died, her school planted a sapling in her memory, alongside a beautiful commemorative plaque. But recently we discovered both were removed years ago to make way for a new classroom block. They hadn't thought to tell us at the time and no one at the school knew what, if anything, had become of the tree or the plaque. We were also struck by the realisation that no one at the school today remembers our daughter at all. We considered dedicating a bench on the hill, in a final effort to keep her memory alive after we are gone, but at Saturday's event we realised the best way to remember Belinda is to help give another young girl the chance of life she never had.

Please let me know the address I should send our cheque to. With it we will enclose love, light and a lifetime of good wishes to Poppy, her family and the doctors treating her – all in the hope they will not endure what we have.

Dear Mr Handler,

You have lately been corresponding with our Campaign Coordinator Sarah-Jane MacDonald, and more recently with Dr Tish Bhatoa, regarding our campaign to raise £250,000 for my granddaughter Poppy's life-saving drug treatment. I understand those negotiations have broken down.

Firstly, may I apologise without reservation for any offence Dr Bhatoa may have caused. Like so many doctors, she is extremely knowledgeable and clever, at the expense of her people-skills. She may be abrupt and uncompromising, but she is very well respected and I know she has Poppy's best interests at heart. Our family has placed all our trust in her, and we do not do that lightly. Secondly, and this is something I have not even told my closest family members, if Poppy is to receive her life-saving drug treatment, it will cost a lot more than £250,000. That figure, huge as it may be, is for just *one* course of the new drug combination. If it proves effective, we will need at least four. But time is running out.

This email is to implore you to rethink your decision to withdraw your kind offer. I don't know whether you are a father or grandfather yourself, but if so, you may have some understanding of how it must feel to watch helplessly as those you love suffer. If Poppy does not recover, she will be robbed of her future, and we will be robbed of ours. That pain and sadness will scar us forever. The shockwaves will be felt throughout our family for a generation or more. That is the legacy of tragedy.

If there is anything I can do to change your mind, please, please let me know what it is. I am happy to provide any information you require and to deal with you directly myself – anonymously, if that is what you prefer. Many, many thanks again for the interest you have shown in my family and for the boundless generosity and kindness behind your offer.

In attendance: Isabel Beck, Sarah-Jane and Kevin MacDonald, Emma Crooks, Celia and Joel Halliday, Karen Payne.

Apologies for absence: Well, none, but I suppose the Haywards and Reswicks would be here, if they could. Also, I know Sam and Kel Greenwood would love to be involved.

Review of previous minutes: As this is the first-ever committee meeting, we don't have any previous minutes. I'll just leave this section blank. Is that ok, Sarah-Jane?

Matters arising:

1. Fundraising to date

Sarah-Jane spoke about Poppy's Ball and how it raised almost £90,000. That, and all the donations received so far, mean that Martin has made the first payment for Poppy's drugs, so that's wonderful news! All we have to do now is raise the rest.

2. Planned events

The next fundraising event is Sam's half-marathon on Sunday. This wasn't mentioned at the meeting, and I didn't want to interrupt anyone, but I'm very keen she gets a good response. She's got 115% of her target already. I'll be there on Sunday to cheer her across the finish and have even made a banner, which I'm hoping Kel will help me unravel.

Some other events were mentioned at this point, but I got lost when everyone was talking. Harley is doing a swim with his swimming club tomorrow. Someone at Celia's work is cycling from Land's End to John O'Groats. Barry is doing an eating challenge called an Elvis Cookathon, but no one seemed convinced that would make any money.

3. Merchandise

Sarah-Jane had the brilliant idea of making a range of merchandise: T-shirts, badges, pens and keyrings. She must have been very confident the committee would approve this, as she and Kevin have already had samples made and decided which manufacturer to use. They've also picked a logo for the campaign that, if I'm honest, looks like a child's drawing of a buttercup with blood on its petals. Sarah-Jane held up a T-shirt to show us and there was a long moment of shocked silence. The thing is, she's worked

so hard I don't think anyone wanted to criticise, so they all said how lovely it looked. I wonder, though: do people who donate realise that some of the money is being spent on merchandise rather than on Poppy's drugs?

4. Ideas-brainstorm

This is where my note-taking skills let me down. Everyone had something to say, and ideas were thrown in, discussed and thrown out at an alarming speed. I think the following is more or less accurate: 1. Karen will hold a race night for her colleagues at work. Apparently, this involves getting old video recordings of horse races for people to bet on. Not my thing at all. According to Kevin, 'those evenings are a licence to print money' and if you 'mark up the bar, you can double profits because drinking and gambling habits go hand in hand'.

2. Emma wants to do a Moonlight Yogathon on Midsummer's Night. She thinks it will be quite popular as it coincides with a full moon. Interestingly, psychotic episodes can coincide with a full moon – ask anyone in A&E.
3. Celia said she will front an *All My Sons* fundraising drive. The profits are already going to the appeal, but she thinks selling merchandise on the nights, taking collection buckets round the audience and handing out leaflets promoting the crowdfunding web link will maximise the potential of our 'captive audience'.
4. A raffle. Sarah-Jane wants to organise a raffle that lasts several weeks to give everyone time to sell lots of tickets. We will all be issued with a set number of tickets to sell to our friends. Hopefully I will be exempt, as all my friends are Fairway Players too and will be selling their own tickets. I nearly fell off Harley's beanbag when SJ said the tickets would be £10 each.

5. Any other business

Sarah-Jane said Martin was surprised everyone knew about Poppy's eyesight problems, as the family hadn't told a soul. She assured us Poppy isn't totally blind yet, but it's on the cards. I didn't want to interrupt anyone, but I've not heard that chemo causes blindness. If Poppy's eyesight is deteriorating at this stage, I would urge them to have an MRI on her optic nerve. Her doctor has probably got it in hand.

Celia made the point that it's not just money for the appeal that will support the family, but practical, hands-on help too. She reeled off a very long list of things she and Joel are doing on a voluntary basis at The Grange. Poppy has her chemo on Mondays and Thursdays, so they always need extra help then, because Helen takes her to Mount More with Paige. Apparently a lot of building work is about to start at The Grange, plus some long-standing events, as well as the day-to-day classes and catering. Emma is looking after the Reswicks' dog and working extra hours. I felt a bit mean, but with my shifts I know I can't manage anything else, even if I was paid for it, let alone if I wasn't, so I didn't say anything.

Sarah-Jane's personal focus for the next couple of weeks will be to increase the social-media presence of the campaign. She is working on the national news sites and channels, but apparently there are so many people raising money for overseas healthcare there isn't much newsworthiness to Poppy's story. I find that extraordinary. Surely we have the best treatment here for free? I think families feel utterly helpless in the face of serious illness, and raising money gives them a way to feel they are doing something to help.

Sarah-Jane asked if we knew any rich people who might make a more substantial donation. If only! She's heard about a wealthy businessman who paid the whole amount to an appeal like Poppy's once. Well, I don't know anyone that well-off, boo.

6. Next meeting

Sarah-Jane has set the next meeting for two weeks' time. I'll need to check what shift I'm on and get a notebook with lines rather than blank pages.

Something finite and low-stress, to get him back in the swing. Perhaps I can keep an eye out? I'll stay in touch with Kel about it. Alternatively I can recommend a good supply agency. Of course, only when he's ready.

One last thing, Sam: who on earth was that girl you'd brought? Kel introduced her as your friend from work, so I'm guessing she's the one you were telling me about. If looks could kill, my funeral is any day now. She

ignored me the whole time. Then in the Cat & Castle, when you two were at the bar, I tried to strike up a conversation – it was a lesson in one-word answers. I asked what was in that huge bag; she muttered ‘nothing’ and, as we were leaving, I saw her dump it in the bin outside. I feel sorry for her, but it’s no wonder she’s falling prey to workplace bullies when she doesn’t make the least effort to engage with others. Some people have ‘victim’ written all over them.

Thanks again for a lovely Sunday and good luck with your post-race muscle recovery programme. One of these days I may join you for a run . . . That is a blatant lie. Well done again and see you in the week. C x

It’s so good to hear from you and know you’re safe. M&D are well enough, photos attached. I wish you could see this home. It’s in a beautiful setting

and so English – Mum loves it! You’d think it was a spa hotel if you didn’t look closely. They have a hydrotherapy pool, a nutritionist and extensive cultivated gardens. Mum and Dad live together in their own unit and have 24-hour care. Very reassuring. The staff are excellent. Now Dad’s that much worse, they appreciate how lonely it can be for Mum, so they help her socialise with other residents while Dad is looked after. It’s not considered the best place in the UK for nothing and not the most expensive for nothing, either, but worth every penny.

Dan, don’t feel guilty. You have work to do out there. M&D know and love you for it, and so do I. If Dad hadn’t been forced to leave Uganda, he would’ve done exactly as you’re doing. It’s just he met Mum and they had the three of us – so his life went in a different direction – but you’re living his dream every single day, remember that. Rav can think what he likes, but he visits them twice a week and that’s more than I have time for, so let’s not be too hard on him, either. Stay in touch. Tish **Transcription from a handwritten notebook found in Isabel Beck’s flat:**

Dear Sam,

This is the first entry in my Blue Book since you arrived at St Ann’s. The last time I even opened it was back in February, when Fucking Frances took everyone for a birthday drink at the end of shift and didn’t invite me. I shouldn’t have reread that just now. I’m supposed to write it all down, turn the page and pull the elastic band across, so the whole episode is over and done with. Only I wanted to see how far I’ve come – or thought I’d come – since then. Surely I can’t be right back there? WHO IS CLAUDIA? WHO IS CLAUDIA? WHO IS CLAUDIA? WHO IS CLAUDIA? Kel said she’s your friend from work. Well, I’m your friend from work. If she’s your friend, why haven’t you mentioned her to me? When Kel introduced me, she said in that confident, dismissive way: ‘Oh yes, Sam told me about you.’ What did you tell her? That we’re best friends? That we’re inseparable? That we have so much in common it’s like we’re secret sisters? That we’re planning a trip to Africa together and don’t need anyone else?

I know the type of person Claudia is. She’ll worm her way into your life and then edge out your true friends, so she’s the only one left; like a cuckoo chick in a sparrow’s nest. She’ll isolate you from everyone who cares about

you and then you'll be dependent on her, which makes her feel powerful, which is what she wants.

You see this is what I shouldn't do. I shouldn't let my mind race ahead into what may happen. I AM NOT BACK WHERE I WAS IN FEBRUARY. When I've finished this entry I'm going to turn the page, pull the elastic band over it, put the Blue Book out of reach and act as if you haven't hurt me at all. I'm going to be an even better friend to you than I was BC (before Claudia) and make sure you see what a fraud she is. I love life now, Sam, and don't want to live if you're not my friend.

Also, Martin contacts Clive Handler despite being assured he's a time-waster. Is that because he's desperate for money or because he doesn't trust Tish Bhatoa? Sam suspects Bhatoa, and I'm inclined to value her view as it's an outsider's perspective.

Hi Claudia, I'd like to give you some feedback from my tour with Isabel today. I'm afraid it didn't go quite to plan. Perhaps you can shed some light on it.

I showed her around the unit, starting with acute, then moving on to bloods. She was fine up to that point, very chatty and interested, but it was

in paediatrics the problem started. She said she needed the loo, so I waited for her on the landing while she popped back to the stairwell washrooms. It was an *age* before she came back. I thought maybe she had an upset stomach and was embarrassed, so didn't want to make a big thing of her absence. It was only later, and quite by chance, that I discovered she hadn't been to the toilet at all, but had retraced our steps back to Paediatric Chemo, asking questions about specific patients. I'm very uncomfortable about it, as the staff there had seen her with me (in her St Ann's uniform too) and gave her the information she asked for without a second thought. Further to our earlier correspondence, the three-month grace on your payment has expired and the full amount is now due. Our invoice is attached. are more secure than these older models, but it's so expensive, and my phone does everything much faster.

I've always fancied a balcony. Imagine eating breakfast on it in the summer. Orange juice, mixed berries and a croissant (so long as I'd reached my ideal weight), followed by black coffee – even though I don't like coffee much, and especially not without milk. I'm going to see if I can open the sliding doors very quietly. I watched them building this block and wondered what the view would be like from the upper floors. Does Arnie know Martin? Dear Ms Greenwood,

I was part of the WaterBorn task force in DRC when you were there with MSF. We didn't meet, but I heard about you from other aid workers. I'm sending this letter via MSF in the hope someone there knows a current address for you. I hope you do not find my news too upsetting.

Two weeks ago we were forced east by a rebel clash with the militia. We found ourselves in Faradje, on the border with South Sudan. It was a barren rural area, so we were surprised to find an encampment that looked like a clinic. It's on the main refugee route from South Sudan, so that would make sense. Yet it was deserted. We moved in and set up emergency water-purifying facilities and basic medicals. It's a divided area between Lingala and Swahili, but by chance our leader, Selima, could speak both. Bit by bit she found out what had happened there. I doubt very much anyone else knows and, even if they do, they may not think to tell you. I don't want you to hear it through the media – that's why I'm writing to you now.

The locals said aid workers built the clinic at a time of heavy traffic between South Sudan and DRC. They tried to establish a medical centre, but there were tensions with the community. It may have been general unrest, or the surge of refugees across the border, but the clinic suffered random raids and the aid workers struggled to stay in control. The fact that they were not pulled out indicates they were working independently and didn't have access to key information.

The man in charge was referred to as Daniel Bangui, but the custom here is to call people by their first name and where they're from (everyone here is from somewhere else). I believe this was Daniel Bhatoa, driven east when he found himself unable to work in the CAR.

After a particularly violent clash, they fled south but were hijacked by militants and driven across the border into South Sudan. Word of mouth is as tricky here as anywhere . . . but Selima says news came back they

were taken to a militant camp, where they were held for as long as their medical supplies lasted. A week at most. Once they were of no further use, and I will spare you the details, they were all killed.

I've wrestled with whether to write this letter or not. You may be angry he was never brought to justice. Resentful that he will likely be hailed a hero. Or you may think he deserved that fate on some level. I don't know how it will affect you, but I feel you should know. We've tried to pass the news on, but there's no one here to get a team across the border to confirm the deaths, or retrieve the bodies, so I have no idea whether even his family are aware of his fate yet. He wasn't married. The sister who came to Bangui and paid for the trial is his next of kin.

I hope you are settling into life back home. It isn't easy, especially when you had to leave the way you did. Something else you should know is that you have a great deal of respect among the aid workers in Bangui and beyond. The irony is, it's changed. You won't believe how many have been quietly reassigned to admin jobs in the cities. You can't tell me those changes took place because they didn't believe something was going on. Wherever there are vulnerable people, there are those who will exploit them, and others who will protect the abusers – because to expose them is to expose their own tacit complicity. Maybe they turned a blind eye to the suffering it caused, because the suffering it alleviated was deemed so much worse . . . whatever is ultimately behind the changes, none would have happened without you speaking up. Thank you.

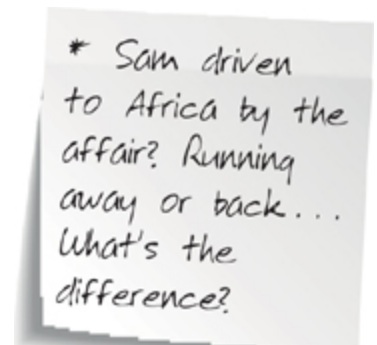

Police Incident Report

Details of crime: Breaking and entering, theft, assault, ABH, false imprisonment

Crime number: 11346778-08

On the morning of 1 July officers arrived at the premises following a 999 call made by the owner, Mr Robert Green, 63. On arrival, they found Mr Green in a distraught state in the front garden, being comforted by neighbours. He told officers he had been the victim of a burglary/assault during the course of which he was tortured regarding the whereabouts of an artwork he had sold some years before. On failing to find the artwork, three masked assailants commenced a messy search of the house, stealing money, jewellery and other small valuables. They left the victim blindfolded, gagged and tied to a radiator. He indicated that the perpetrators gained access to the house on the afternoon of the previous day – Saturday 30 June 2018. He says they broke in through French windows and spent around an hour there before fleeing. It took the victim sixteen hours to work his way free and raise the alarm.

Perpetrator descriptions:

Male 1 – white, medium build, dark hair, London accent

Male 2 – white, stocky build, gravelly voice, London accent

Male 3 – white, light build, slow voice (like a drawl), indeterminate accent

Notes: The victim gave officers the names of people who might believe he was still in possession of the artwork. As he had been due to travel away from home that weekend, he suggested the intruders were not expecting to find him in. They did not seem to be armed; however, they used items in the house as weapons, including a wooden figurine and a long metal antique shoehorn. Despite being bruised, the victim repeatedly declined officers' polite suggestions that he should go to hospital. The victim has an extensive collection of African crafts. Male 3 correctly identified and then stole a Healing Doll, picture attached, meaning he must have some knowledge or experience of such cultural artefacts.

* The victim requests the violent nature of the attack remain out of the media. Initial press releases should give only sparse details of items stolen, until possible dispersal channels are ruled out.

Dear Dr Bhatoa,

Further to your calls regarding the last-known whereabouts of your brother Dr Daniel Bhatoa, I can only tell you that reports on the ground confirm he moved from Bangui several months ago and has not been seen since. He left shortly after funding for his women's health clinic was refused. I have no idea why he led you to believe he was still there, but the possibility that he travelled east into remote and war-torn territory is a very real one. Perhaps he did not want you to worry.

As you know, that region suffers from violent clashes as well as sparse electricity and water, so few aid agencies maintain a presence there. Furthermore, the local populations, such as they are, tend to be displaced peoples, migrants and refugees fleeing fighting elsewhere, so there are cultural and language barriers to the transmission of information. Having said that, I understand Daniel Bhatoa has a reputation for not only surviving the most adverse situations, but also thriving in them. He is experienced in the field, with good local knowledge and language skills. We need not assume the worst just yet.

I have made enquiries where I can and you are welcome to make your own via your contacts at DfID and any other source you think may have more information. If I have any confirmed news, of course I will let you know immediately.

A woman walked into Lockley Bois police office with information about the above crime. She did not wish her identity to be recorded, but claimed an individual named Arnold Ballancore was in possession of an African Healing Doll on Saturday 30 June, shortly after the above crime took place. She witnessed him give the doll to a two-year-old child who has been unwell. The woman claims her suspicions were only raised when she read press reports stating that African crafts had been stolen during the aggravated burglary above. She recognised the doll as being of genuine Central African origin, an area she claims Mr Ballancore also knows well. She further suspects Mr Ballancore's involvement, as he was stranded in Lockley Bois on the afternoon of 30 June. I am intrigued he knew about the Healing Doll and gave it to a young girl who is unwell. Behaviour quite at odds with the savagery he exhibited during the attack, as he was easily the most aggressive of the three. That particular example is thought to be an effigy of an ancestral spirit and is very old. Yes, it is a direct antecedent of the 'voodoo' we know from cultures in Haiti and other regions where Africans have settled. However, far from the 'spooky' connotations we associate with animist belief systems, the doll would have been made when a girl was born, to keep negative energy, spells and ill health at bay. In other words, the original owner reached adulthood – usually deemed to be the point when she has her first child – and gave this one away, or even sold it, as a doll with proven protective powers. Following a 999 call, Constable Liam Albutt and myself found alleged assailants barricaded into a side room. Liam forced the door – inside, two women were fighting on the floor – a nurse and another. We separated them and I took the other woman out of the ward. She was unhurt. Would not say what happened or why. Liam spoke to the nurse, who was bleeding from nose and forehead. The nurse admitted she knew the other woman, said the attack was unprovoked, yet 'understandable'. Neither wanted to press charges and, having established no one was badly hurt, we left a colleague to take the nurse to A&E and escorted the other woman from the premises. No further action was taken.

Extract from police interview with Arnold Ballancore, arrested on 4 July 2018:

Sgt Cooper: So take us back to when you met this gentleman.

A. Ballancore: Sharkey took me to him. Said he was all right, a proper mate. I took his word for it.

Sgt Cooper: Sharkey the heroin dealer . . . ?

A. Ballancore: Yeah. But he was so wrong. He robbed every bit of money off me. Over six grand. But he said I had to get him more.

Sgt Cooper: This is some of the money you owed Sharkey for heroin.

A. Ballancore: Yeah.

Sgt Cooper: And you yourself had taken the money from Sean Greenwood's account?

A. Ballancore: Who?

Sgt Cooper: Your friend Sean Greenwood. Although I doubt he's a friend now.

Sgt Crowe: The account of Sean Kelly Greenwood and Samantha Greenwood.

A. Ballancore: Oh. Kel. Yeah, Kel Greenwood. He's not . . . he *is*, he's a friend, but you know when a friend does something you hate? So he's not your friend, but he still is?

Sgt Cooper: Right.

A. Ballancore: No one should treat Sam like that, after all she did.

Sgt Cooper: So Sharkey took you where?

A. Ballancore: I don't know, man. Out in the sticks. A gnarly old place like in *Withnail and I*. Sharkey says if I do a job with this Corey and another dude called Gray, they'll pay off my debt to him and he'd leave me alone.

A. Ballancore: No comment.

Sgt Cooper: So, via Sharkey, you meet two men known only to you as Corey and Gray.

A. Ballancore: No comment.

Sgt Cooper: They brief you on a burglary they are planning, during which they intend to steal a painting called *World* by Irma Stern, while its

owner is abroad.

A. Ballancore: No comment.

Sgt Cooper: They need you to help carry it.

A. Ballancore: No comment.

Sgt Cooper: On the afternoon of 30 June this year, they take you to 42 Victoria Gardens, Lockley Bois, where the three of you break into the house, via the rear doors, and search for the painting.

A. Ballancore: No comment.

Sgt Cooper: However, upon entry you all discover that the home owner Mr Robert Green, who you believed to be absent, is still there. You proceed to assault Mr Green, tie him up and beat him.

A. Ballancore: Not me.

Sgt Cooper: What did you do?

A. Ballancore: Not that. No way.

Sgt Cooper: So I take it you're saying Mr Corey and Mr Gray did the beating up and torture while you stood and watched?

Sgt Crowe: For the benefit of the transcript, Mr Ballancore has pushed his chair away from the table and has his head in his hands.

Sgt Cooper: Take your time, Arnie, but the sooner you tell us what happened, the sooner we can identify who *did* torture Mr Green, and the sooner you can go home.

Sgt Cooper: Do you join them in a violent and messy search of the property, during which you help them steal cash, watches, antique rings, ornaments and an African Healing Doll?

A. Ballancore: No comment.

Sgt Cooper: You spent three years working in Africa, didn't you? Do you know what a Healing Doll is, Arnold?

A. Ballancore: I didn't steal anything. I took the doll, but it wasn't theft. Sam and Kel know a kid who's really sick. They're raising money to get help for her. But money won't cure a thing. Not a thing. That doll was old. It's powerful. It didn't belong to him. They protect little girls. I took it for the kid. It belongs with her.

Sgt Crowe: Unfortunately for you, it belongs with Mr Green. He's the one who bought it.

Dear Sam,

We are all reeling from your outburst this evening. Not least because until that moment you seemed to be a hard-working team player committed to the group. It is unusual for a new member to be cast in a play without working backstage first, but such was our generosity, we waived this convention and welcomed you and Kel in. Amateur drama requires commitment, dedication and cooperation, but most of all it requires trust – and until tonight I felt we could trust you. I am only sorry you did not express your true thoughts sooner.

While I can only apologise for the fact some Fairway Players seem to think you took money from the appeal – I have corrected anyone and everyone who mentioned this to me – the rumour arose precisely because you hoaxed us early on with the promise that the drugs would be paid for. You must therefore take some responsibility for the confusion. I know both Sarah-Jane and I want to discuss that issue privately with you, and are

prepared to hear your side of the story. We were also prepared to wait until the play was over. However, you left us with no choice but to thrash it out in public this evening. For the record, the Clive Handler episode was a cruel and heartless deception that heaped more agony on a family already suffering the unimaginable. You say you did it to investigate a potential fraud elsewhere, but that is no excuse, I'm afraid.

Tonight was meant to be a chance for everyone to rehearse *All My Sons* for the last time. Now, thanks to you, the whole cast and crew have been denied this vital element of the process, not to mention the stress and duress you put Helen through.

My wife has endured a great deal and does not have to defend herself to you. You may well believe Poppy's appeal to be poorly run, but we are doing the best we can under difficult circumstances. As for the very personal accusations you made against Helen, I will not dignify them by discussion. Except to remind you that most Fairway Players have known us both for many years. If what you said were accurate, others would connect the dots and believe you. You saw yourself how few allies you had – not even your own husband supported you – an indication of how wide of the mark you were.

A great many people have put in months of hard work to bring *All My Sons* to the stage. If you do not intend to play any further part in the production, you will be letting them all down. However, if you do not return tomorrow, as with every hurdle we face, we will get over it. I only ask that you let us know your intentions, as they were not clear from the manner in which you left the rehearsal. Regards, Martin

Paige is laughing and chatting to everyone as if she's been in the play from the beginning. Between you and me, she doesn't suit that dowdy costume as well as I would have. Marianne had to alter it to fit her, which took ages. Still, as you say, Martin knows best. Well, SJ's just given me another look, so I'd better go. Deep breath and . . . this is it. Issy **Review of the first night of the play, published online 6 July 2018:**

All My Sons by The Fairway Players

Deep trouble in the deep south 🖐🖐🖐🖐

by Amanda Basham Arthur Miller constructs a play the way a sculptor creates a three-dimensional image from an amorphous chunk of clay. He shows us a basic shape. Then bends and stretches its contours, turns it for us to view alternate angles, gradually reveals its finer details until, finally, we can see for ourselves what it really is.

Miller's *All My Sons* debuted in 1947. In the heart of small-town America, Joe and Kate Keller enjoy a comfortable lifestyle, thanks to their aviation business and the money they made from the Second World War. While their son Chris returned from the Western Front a hero, their other son Larry has been 'missing in action' for three years. Kate refuses to believe he is anything but alive and well and will be on his way home soon. When Larry's girlfriend, Ann Deever, returns with her brother George, we see a different side to the Kellers, as the awful truth about Joe's business practices comes to light.

Fresh from their breezy production of Noel Coward's *Blithe Spirit* earlier this year, The Fairway Players, under co-directors Martin and James Hayward, treat Miller's classic with all the reverence it deserves. More talking than action means greater pressure on the actors to deliver on pace and emotion. Helen Grace-Hayward, whose perfect comic timing as Elvira made *Blithe Spirit* such a treat, here shows us that her talent for drama is every bit as well honed.

Her Kate Keller is a woman happy to exist in a state of delusion, remote from the uncomfortable realities that gradually close in until, in a shockingly tragic twist, she must face them head-on and alone. I barely dared breathe during Kate's final scenes, such was Grace-Hayward's onstage charisma and intensity of commitment to this demanding role. Her impeccable performance was almost matched by John O'Dea, a superficially jovial Joe, who sinks into awful realisation as the truth is unveiled. Of course mastering an American accent is key to delivering this play and if I were told both leads were genuinely from the region, I would happily believe it.

Unfortunately, the same cannot be said for every performer in this amateur production. I noticed several slips of intonation and the odd English vowel here and there. Sarah-Jane MacDonald played Ann, a woman on a painful and angry mission, with a faltering, distracted edge I wasn't entirely convinced by. Nick Walford as Ann's brother George, a newly qualified lawyer spoiling for a fight with Joe, could have been better rehearsed. His most convincing scenes were those where he clashed with the Kellers' surviving son Chris, played by his real-life brother Barry.

The Kellers' neighbours provide both insight and (minimal) light relief for the audience. Kevin MacDonald was solidly convincing as Jim Bayliss, a doctor with a perpetual streaming cold. Paige Reswick shone as his wife

Sue, a performance all the more commendable as she took on the role with half a day's rehearsal, when the company was let down by the original cast member.

On the other side of the Kellers is the Lubey family. Newcomer Kel Greenwood, in his inevitably nervous stage debut, plays amateur astrologer Frank as a limping nuisance. This outwardly bumbling dolt is clever, selfish and cowardly enough to dodge the draft to raise a family with George's homely ex-girlfriend Lydia.

Mention must be made of young Harley MacDonald, who delighted everyone with his sensitive portrayal of local cheeky-chappie Bert. His word-perfect performance and convincing accent lead me to suspect he is a starring Fairway Player of the future.

The simple set, designed by Joel Halliday, did not distract from the actors' work, while delightful 1940s costumes and make-up, thanks to Marianne Payne and Denise Malcolm, helped transport us in time and place.

Finally, no one could miss the brightly clad fundraising team who were out in force all evening, reminding us that this production has a very important purpose. The players are raising money for sight-impaired Poppy Reswick, who needs life-saving brain-tumour treatment in America. I wish them luck for their appeal and the final two nights of *All My Sons*.

Dear both,

That is all the correspondence submitted at the original hearing. Remember: these ‘conversations’ were only ever intended for the person(s) to whom they were addressed. We might assume no one else, much less a court of law, was ever meant to hear them – but would we be correct? Wittingly or unwittingly, all these people gave evidence. They did so freely, in their own words and without the intimidation of the witness box – yet without ever committing to tell the truth. I believe somewhere in there is the key to why Samantha Greenwood was found dead, under her fifth-floor balcony, on 6 July 2018, where she had lain for around twenty-four hours. Cause of death was multiple injuries, consistent with a fall from that height, but incompatible with life. In addition, her body exhibited minor injuries to the face and torso, but according to the coroner, these were most likely caused the previous day in the assault at St Ann’s. So . . .

1. Who killed Samantha Greenwood?
2. In the hours before her death, she told three people three things. Who and what?
3. Who knew it was going to happen?
4. Who knew about it before her body was discovered?
5. Who is erroneously imprisoned and why?

We must submit our case to the Court of Appeal this week, so time is not on our side.

I need a single document that explores these questions. Please put forward evidence, plus clearly reasoned arguments, for or against particular theories and suspects. Your role as fresh young eyes on this is crucial. I believe there is an innocent person in jail, but I’m no maverick – I need you to see it, too.

If you can solve these further riddles, then it’s more than I could at the original hearing: three people are not who they say they are. Three

masquerade as others. One does not exist at all. To help you here, Sandra has completed a full list of participants in this case. It is attached. She has placed them in their main social groups rather than alphabetical order. I am reluctant to request a change as I gather from her demeanour it was a long and laborious job as is.

Finally, some facts available to the court and not clear from the correspondence:

1. Officially, Sam was forced to resign from her overseas volunteer post due to ill health.
2. Both Sam and Kel were prescribed Interferon and Ribavirin to control the effects of chronic Hepatitis C, contracted during their time in the Central African Republic. Neither disclosed this to St Ann's. Sean 'Kel' Greenwood was subsequently suspended and resigned.
3. Isabel Beck was on disciplinary probation for eighteen months following an incident in the orthopaedic ward at St Ann's, where she attached the wrong intravenous bag to a patient who then had to be resuscitated.
4. There were no signs of forced entry to the Greenwoods' flat the night Samantha Greenwood died.

I look forward to receiving your document before 9 a.m. tomorrow.

The murder of Samantha Greenwood

*Exploratory document for Roderick Tanner, QC, School of Law,

Introduction

After eight years of living on the precipice of human experience Samantha Greenwood arrives 'home', only to fall victim to violence as savage as any she can have witnessed in war-torn Central Africa. She is described as 'an honest and hard-working lady of principle who is not afraid to speak'. It seems such fearlessness could have led to her murder. In this document we

will examine events leading up to Ms Greenwood's death, and the complex relationships between those witnesses who knew her and those who assumed they did.

Before we consider our suspects, we would like to identify five interlocking microcosms:

- The Fairway Players and their production of Arthur Miller's classic drama *All My Sons*.
- The medical staff at St Ann's and Mount More.
- The appeal to raise money for Poppy Reswick's cancer treatment.
- Two intertwined dynasties: the Haywards and Reswicks, the Dearings and MacDonalds.
- The Africa connection, and how something a world away can have such a profound influence.

Samantha Greenwood

Sam arrives in Lockwood as an outsider on a number of levels. Thanks to Isabel, she and Kel find themselves at the bottom of a strict, well-established social hierarchy. Their experience as humanitarian volunteers is so remote from that of everyone else that it counts for nothing. Here, life revolves around two interlocking family dynasties: the Haywards and Reswicks, the Dearings and MacDonalds. A person's closeness to the alpha family – the Haywards – determines their social status. For example, Shelley Dearing is not high enough to be seated on the top table at the ball.

A large, wealthy, influential family is a powerful unit. The Haywards are successful, intelligent business people. They employ many locals and run a high-profile drama society. They are well respected in the community and by their employees. Sarah-Jane mentions how hard everyone works, unpaid, during Poppy's Ball. Meanwhile, Celia and Joel volunteer at The Grange, while Emma takes in Paige's sick and troublesome dog. Celia and Carol compete for friendship with Helen. Being of value to the alpha family can lead to increased social standing and subsequently greater confidence and self-respect within the community.

We see how someone not part of this social hierarchy – like Nigel Crowley – isn't as sympathetic or keen to go the extra mile. Meanwhile we also see, initially at least, that Sam and Kel want to be part of this world.

They join The Fairway Players despite having no interest in theatre, and as soon as they learn about Poppy's illness, they mine their medical contacts for information to help her (27 April). Sam quickly commits to run a sponsored half-marathon and tries to help the family when she suggests on 30 April that Martin lobbies Parliament (which later leads him to construe that she is paranoid about authority).

We should consider Sam's behaviour in the context of what has gone before. In Bangui, she tried to bring the truth out into the open, but was discredited and silenced. We suspect her accusations against Dan Bhatoa could be behind her discharge from frontline medical volunteering, even if her health was cited as the reason.

When she arrives at St Ann's, it seems Sam's commitment to putting right what she sees as wrong is undimmed by her recent experience. During her first meeting with Claudia on 22 April she lists everything she thinks is wrong with the Elderly Care ward. She either hasn't learned the fate of the whistleblower, or she's learned it but is strong enough to put herself on the line again. By her second meeting on 18 May, she's using Claudia for information about Tish Bhatoa.

Martin concludes that Sam is paranoid about authority, but is that any surprise when she has challenged authority, only to have it close ranks and let an injustice go unpunished? It surely cannot be a coincidence that they have arrived in Dan Bhatoa's sister's Healthcare Trust. If Sam's intention is to discredit Bhatoa, in revenge for defending Dan in Bangui, then can her actions be viewed in that light and her accusations dismissed? Does she see things that aren't there and stir up trouble where none exists? Early in this correspondence, Issy observes that the UK 'probably seems very dull in comparison' to the Greenwoods' life abroad. Is Sam subconsciously generating excitement and drama to replace all she lost over there?

As it is, Sam reports Tish to the BMA on 18 May and follows up her accusation with evidence in the form of the Poppy's Ball programme on 5 June. She's out to get Tish in whatever way she can.

We also noted that Sam is not afraid to lie and deceive when the aim is to uncover a deeper, more significant truth. While we have no access to Sam's personal emails here, we *do* in fact hear directly from her. In the 'voice' of Clive Handler on 30 May, she describes the suggestion that he use an offshore account as 'not "quite legitimate", it is a loophole, but one I am prepared to jump through for the greater good'. Through the course of this

correspondence Sam deceives the Haywards, Claudia, Isabel and others, all in pursuit of a ‘greater good’. By the time she confronts the Haywards at the dress rehearsal on 4 July she has clearly amassed what she believes to be strong evidence that they have deceived and defrauded their loyal friends in order to preserve their own businesses and lifestyle. But is she right?

What did Samantha tell the drama group, and could she be correct?

There is no question Samantha Greenwood hits a nerve when she addresses The Fairway Players at their dress rehearsal for *All My Sons*. Helen, who ‘so rarely cries’, exhibits inconsolable distress, and Martin is so disturbed – possibly by Sam’s accusations, possibly by the uncharacteristic reaction of his wife – that he abandons the crucial rehearsal completely. The community is firmly on Helen’s side. We believe the key to Sam’s murder lies in what she revealed that night. But how right is she, and who stands to lose the most from what she says?

From Sarah-Jane we discover that Sam claims to know the following:

- The appeal is a ‘financial conspiracy’.
- There are no experimental drugs. Poppy is undergoing a course of conventional chemotherapy at Mount More.
- Poppy’s notes are not kept at the hospital.
- Helen did not have a little boy who died of meningitis, as she claims – it is a story to engage the community with the appeal. There is no mention of it here, but as we will see below, Poppy’s ‘sight loss’ is exactly this.
- That if he *really were the victim of a fraud*, then Martin deserves to be beaten at his own game. Sam seems to doubt the Lydia Drake story.
- Martin later distils what Sam says about the appeal into the phrase ‘poorly run’, as if to dilute the power of her accusations.

We would like to explore Sam’s claims.

To what extent is the appeal being used for personal gain, and by whom?

We are unanimous that *someone* is using Poppy’s fund money for their own purposes, but is it Martin, Tish or both? If it’s both, then are they in collusion or not? At this point we cannot rule other members of the Hayward and Reswick families in or out of the deception.

Both Martin and Tish have onerous financial responsibilities. But which came first: their money worries or the appeal? The appeal raises a great deal of cash very quickly. Did they see this and *then* realise they could solve their financial issues – confident the cash flow would continue? If so, then we can see how it might subsequently be difficult to *stop* taking money from the fund, especially as they can hide behind Sarah-Jane while she lobbies friends and family. The curse of easy money . . .

If we chart the progress of the ‘lie’ that Poppy is going blind, we may find some clues. It starts with good intentions. On 18 May, Sarah-Jane must convince Nigel Crowley to play at Poppy’s Ball for free. There is no time to find another band and she wants to spend as little of the fund money as possible on event expenses. Initially she tells him Poppy is a fan of his music and listens to it while having her cancer treatment. This innocuous untruth does not convince Crowley to change his mind. The more emotive lie about Poppy losing her sight is blurted out just as he seems out of reach. Having pulled this ‘fact’ from thin air, Sarah-Jane is then honest with the Haywards about what she’s done, expressing horror at telling such a ‘whopper’. The Haywards find this predicament amusing, with Martin content to continue the ‘lie’ for the benefit of the event. At no point does anyone suggest revealing the truth to Crowley.

Inevitably, word gets around about Poppy losing her eyesight. Isabel believes the family has ‘the wrong end of the stick’. Meanwhile Sam sources information that suggests the family is simply focusing on the side-effect they fear most. Both have enough medical knowledge to doubt the claim.

It does not escape the family that any mention of blindness increases donations to the appeal. In fundraising updates, Poppy’s sight loss is continually alluded to: ‘We are also facing the fact her eyesight will be affected – which makes every day that she can still see all the more poignant’ (9 June). Having said that, a few days earlier Glen questions what people will think when they see Poppy is obviously not blind: ‘We don’t want anyone feeling they’ve been conned, when they’ve been kind enough to support us’ (3 June). Is this something he would say if it were a premeditated deception? We suspect that, after the lie works so well with Nigel, the family comes to regard such ‘fibs’ as an acceptable part of the fundraising process.

By the time Martin sends his update telling their fundraising community about the Clive Handler hoax on 23 June, he categorically states that Poppy's chemo has 'resulted in hair loss and blindness'. We are unanimous in the belief that Poppy is not losing her eyesight – we later learn she has not lost her hair, either, yet Paige shaves her head on 2 July because people 'expect' a child with cancer to be bald – are they cynically manipulating their friends, or is it simply a convenient lie they now believe themselves?

Martin becomes increasingly vague about how much money has been raised and how much is needed. He is otherwise pedantic and efficient, yet we can see throughout this correspondence how reluctant he is to engage with Sarah-Jane's requests for a definitive figure. His son James refers to his 'petulant vagueness' in response to stress. Yet on occasions when we might assume Martin is under pressure, such as after Sam's outburst at the dress rehearsal on 4 July, he displays great clarity of thought and measured calmness in his correspondence with both Sam and Sarah-Jane. Could it be that he is undertaking a 'financial deception' that is the source of far greater stress and anxiety than anything concerning the drama group?

We also have another train of thought. That the Haywards are acting in good faith, but that Tish Bhatoa is deceiving *them*. Samantha Greenwood exercises suspicions early on that Tish is not being honest with them about the drug treatment Poppy needs. The whole Clive Handler hoax throws doubt on the entire premise of the appeal. In Bangui, Sam witnessed Bhatoa work to get her brother off charges of inappropriate behaviour. This could easily colour Sam's perception of anything Bhatoa says or does, but just because Tish is prepared to bend the truth to protect her brother does not mean she is guilty of defrauding the Haywards, or of Sam's murder. Similarly, the fact that Sam harbours a grudge against Tish does not mean the doctor is innocent of defrauding the appeal.

We both agree on one thing: by the time Martin reveals the truth about Lydia Drake on 3 July, he, James and Glen are all on the same page, all in on some sort of conspiracy – apparently in isolation from Helen, Paige and Olivia. It seems the Hayward women are spared any stress and financial responsibility. Martin tells James and Glen on several occasions to keep facts from Helen.

Martin very clearly calculates a time to tell the drama group about the Lydia Drake fraud: 'Tuesday. After their committee meeting and before the play. Don't email. Come round if you need to speak' (1 July). This is also

one of many occasions when Martin tells his son and son-in-law not to email, apparently mindful that this evidence could be used against them. We also note a curious one-line email from Martin to James on 2 June: 'I know what you mean. Thank you', in response to a bland statement about making memories with Poppy. We think Martin thanks him for the reminder that this correspondence could be used as evidence in their favour, should they be found out.

Speaking of evidence, we see Glen's panic when the police visit on 4 July. Martin says: 'Surely they'd come here first. Is Paige there? Can you hide?' There is palpable relief when the police only want to see the Healing Doll. What are they hiding?

Finally, on 3 July Sarah-Jane MacDonald says to Kevin: 'The stress is written on their faces.' But is it solely the stress of Poppy's illness, or also a financial fraud that has spiralled out of the family's control?

Do the experimental drugs exist at all?

This is the question behind Sam's deception of the Haywards when she poses as Clive Handler on 20 and 30 May. Why does she play such a cruel trick on a family already under enormous emotional pressure? It seems out of character for her. If we follow the correspondence, its primary aim is to discover where in the US the drugs originate. On 2 May Sam asks Martin and Tish, but can't get an answer; she asks her medical contacts, no luck there either. So she resorts to this underhand way to find out, perhaps not appreciating how much it will hurt the family.

Speaking as Handler on 30 May, Sam tells Tish that the fund is a lie to manipulate the Haywards. If she has hit the nail on the head at this point, surely Tish would bail out there and then, knowing she's been found out – and by someone unafraid to speak. Therefore if the appeal is a fraud, the Haywards *must* be in on it to some degree.

Sam's success as Clive Handler serves another, unanticipated function. It leads her to construct a more sophisticated deception later, when she poses as Isabel to trawl through the medical records at Mount More.

Poppy is having conventional chemo at Mount More – so why are her notes not kept at the hospital?

We can say for sure: Poppy's drugs are administered by Hickman line into her chest on a twice-weekly basis at Mount More's Paediatric Oncology

department. By manipulating Claudia, Sam poses as Isabel to infiltrate the system there on 22 June. She fails to find Poppy's medical notes. While we have no idea how typical this is, or if there could be an innocent explanation – Poppy is one of Tish Bhatoa's private patients, after all – the fact that Sam identifies it as unusual has to be taken into account. We are not entirely in agreement that, having been out of the country for eight years, Sam could know what current treatment pathways are, or that her professional experience would qualify her to judge the decisions of a senior consultant in Oncology.

Did Helen have a little boy who died of meningitis or is this a story to engage the community with the appeal?

Sam is consulting a genealogist about Helen on 25 June, so presumably she is the source of the information that Helen did not have a child before James. What led Sam to go down this route of enquiry we don't yet know, but Andrea Morley is likely to be the 'Andy' we hear on the answering service the night Sam is killed. Sam often goes missing from work through illness or days off. But is she ill with the condition that we know she has, or is she meeting Andrea, or both?

This question is one that seems to play on Sarah-Jane's mind after Sam's outburst at the dress rehearsal. Emma's corroboration convinces Sarah-Jane and, on the whole, us too. However, with no further evidence, we do not feel able to explore this point fully.

Is there any mileage in the accusation that Martin fabricates the Lydia Drake 'fraud'?

As we've seen, the 'financial conspiracy' accusation is very likely true, to one extent or another. However, Sam throws doubt on the Lydia Drake fraud here, and we can't see why Martin would pretend to have been conned. We are more inclined to believe greed convinced him to fall for Lydia Drake's promises – whether that 'greed' is for Poppy's cure or his own financial gain remains to be determined. It does beg the question: who is Lydia Drake?

What is the relationship between Sam and Issy?

With only one side of this correspondence available to us, nonetheless we can see how Isabel Beck quickly becomes a needy, high-maintenance

friend. However, through her we learn some key facts about Sam, especially when James – one of the few characters sympathetic to Issy – asks her what Sam is like. From Issy's answer we deduce that: people listen to her, she gets on with everyone and she gets things done. These qualities all backfired in Bangui, and again at the dress rehearsal. We were interested to observe that when Isabel 'speaks', as she does through the committee minutes she sends to the whole group on 6 June, for the most part people take very little notice. Sarah-Jane even says to her 'no one cares what you think'. Issy is simply not high enough up the social ladder to have a voice. We are also bemused to note that Issy is the only cast member of *All My Sons* not credited by name in the online review published on 6 July. Even onstage, Issy goes unnoticed.

Sam tells Claudia she's desperate to be rid of Issy, but is that true? Sam uses Claudia and Isabel to conduct an audacious deception that leads directly to her making the accusations that very probably lead to her death. Sam asks Claudia to arrange a tour of Mount More for 'Isabel'. Only the email address she gives her is a false one. Sam, as Isabel, accepts the invitation and meets Ziggy for the tour, where she absconds to look up Poppy Reswick's treatment plan and medical records. Our primary evidence for this is how Ziggy describes the 'Isabel' she meets as 'chatty and interested'. The Isabel we know is the exact opposite of that.

We wonder why Sam doesn't simply organise a tour of the department under her own identity. We think she is wary of Tish Bhatoa hearing her name and feels safer undercover.

This deception is one Sam finds herself having to shore up repeatedly. She must tell Isabel she was speaking to Claudia about having Frances (you-know-who or YKW) moved from Elderly Care. Isabel then nags her about this on 23 and 25 June. Sam must also lie to Claudia on 26 June and say that she's ill, in order to keep her away from the Yogathon, where she'll meet Isabel – who knows nothing about the tour. After the Mount More visit, Sam must keep them apart. When Sam's relationship with Claudia threatens to undermine her relationship with Issy, Sam is obliged to foster Issy's flagging friendship. As much as Sam might find Issy a drain, she wants to keep her onside, to use her and avoid her becoming vengeful.

We believe Sam fails to appreciate the long-term consequences of her actions when she has her mind set on a higher truth.

It is easy to focus on what Sam thinks of Issy, but we should also take into account how Issy feels about Sam. Her neediness borders on obsession, and where obsession is concerned, isn't there a fine line between love and hate? Obsessive love – if it can be described as 'love' at all – can change direction in a flash. When Issy spots Sam having lunch with Claudia in the Orangery on 13 June, she types an unsent email that ends 'I hate Claudia, I hate myself and I hate . . .' The missing word, we think, is 'you', meaning Sam. Issy feels dependent on Sam for her own social status and self-respect, but dependence breeds resentment.

We discussed at length Issy's curious inaccurate observation on 1 July that Topps Tiles is visible from the Greenwoods' balcony and have the following theory to expound. There is a moment, the morning after the Yogathon, when Issy wanders around the Greenwoods' lounge. This is when Issy has hands-on access to Sam's life.

During the altercation between Arnie and Barry, when Kel and Sam separate their troubled friend from the affray, Arnie blurts out to Sam that Kel has been seeing Claudia. We believe Issy hears this, too. Isabel describes herself as someone who likes to plan ahead. But we can see she is just as much an opportunist. Therefore we think it possible that, when the opportunity arises, Issy uses Sam's laptop – an old one, so old it does not feature a security password – to send an email to Michael D'Souza. She impersonates Sam to tell him about the affair, to hammer the final nail into Sam's friendship with Claudia and stir up trouble for her nemesis. We are going to assert that Topps Tiles is visible from *elsewhere* in the flat, where Issy was situated at the exact time she pretended to be out on the balcony.

Issy could not have guessed her email would lead Claudia to attack Sam on 4 July. We believe Claudia probably reproached Sam during the attack for telling Michael when she had begged her not to, for the sake of their children. This could be the moment Sam realises Issy is behind it all. We know Sam has harsh words with Issy after the dress rehearsal, leaving even Sarah-Jane feeling sorry for her. But what does she say? Perhaps that she knows Issy sent the email to Michael. Or that she has never liked her and was only pretending to be her friend. Whatever it is may be devastating, but is it enough to turn Issy's toxic 'love' for Sam into hate and ultimately murder? By the next morning Issy's loyalties are firmly with the community, whose attitude to her is at best indifferent.

What were Sam's intentions?

We believe that at the point she discovers Kel is having an affair with Claudia, Sam decides to return to the Central African Republic. Only she is unable to do so because Arnie stole their money after Kel gave him their PIN number on 25 June. Does frustration over this, the end of her marriage, her attack at the hands of Claudia and her constant management of Isabel's obsession lead to Sam's outburst? We are certain her outburst leads to her downfall.

Femi

I'm worried about the time this is taking. We're not even halfway through. Are we getting wrapped up in the minutiae and missing the bigger picture?

Charlotte

I don't think so. I like it so far. It's just a bit wordy. We need to show we've discussed all the possibilities.

Femi

We need to answer the fucking questions. Go back to Tanner's letter. He asks five questions, then some random shit.

Charlotte

If we just A the Qs, we barely touch the surface of the underlying relationships.

Femi

Here goes. Who killed Samantha Greenwood? Kevin MacDonald. Sam tells three people three things: the drama group about the appeal, Issy that she knows she told Michael about Claudia, and Kel that she's returning to Africa. Sarah-Jane knew it was going to happen. Emma knew about it before the body was discovered. Kel is imprisoned because it's always the nearest and dearest in the frame.

Charlotte

The message from Andy telling Sam something she can't unknown? It's left while she's at the dress rehearsal on the evening of 4 July.

Femi

Red herring. Kevin wants Sam gone because he's involved so many masonic contacts in the appeal. He confronts her in the flat, they fight, Sam dies. SJ flees to Emma's for an alibi but, phew, Kel is charged.

Charlotte

Would SJ cover for murder the way she lied for the Haywards?

Femi

Yes. So, three are not who they say they are: Handler is really Sam, Drake is Glen and Kel is Sean. Three masquerade as others: Sam as Issy, Issy as Sam, Arnie as Kel. One does not exist: don't know. Handler and Drake both.

Charlotte

Glen is Drake? Conning his father-in-law and defrauding his own daughter's appeal or are they all in it together?

Femi

He was prepared to have Woof put down on 26 June and then lie to his wife about it. Harsh.

Charlotte

You are so fucking good at this. I feel like a spare part.

Femi

Not at all. Ok, new angle for the doc. Prime suspects, plus reasoning behind each.

Charlotte

Hope we're right about the Topps Tiles thing. Otherwise it looks like we're making things up to fit the facts. Why would Issy bother to tell Michael, when Sam knows already that Claudia has betrayed her and is unlikely ever to be friends with her again?

Femi

To turn Claudia against Sam. It works, too. Initially better than Issy ever thought it would – it leads Claudia to attack her. But then

it turns Sam against Issy. That's what I believe informs their final convo in the car park after the dress rehearsal.

Comment [Femi1]:

Charl, here it is with your amends. Prime suspects, followed by outside suspects.

Who killed Samantha Greenwood?

We have four prime suspects. They are presented in no particular order.

Sean 'Kel' Greenwood

Most women who are murdered are killed by their husband or partner. Kel was forced to return from his dream job as a medical aid worker and has found it difficult to readjust to life in England. His relationship with Claudia has been dragged into the open. His confidant, Arnie, betrayed him by stealing all his money, embarrassed him in front of his new social circle and revealed to his wife, in the cruellest way possible, that he is having an affair with her friend. Yet he can see Arnie is unwell and feels responsible for him. Added to this: Kel is ill himself with Hepatitis C, which he keeps secret from his employer. We know Sam and Kel have been arguing in their flat at night, from a note sent by their neighbours on 2 July. Kel did not want Sam to say anything at the dress rehearsal and threatened her with consequences if she did – that she would never see him again.

Kel and Claudia are seen entering a local motel together after 2 a.m. on 5 July by Nick Walford, looking 'like someone had died'. The next day Kel is off-radar, only replying to an email from Sarah-Jane. He arrives for the first night of the play limping. His performance is described as 'nervous'.

Interestingly, Kel's email to Sarah-Jane suggests he agrees with what Sam says at the dress rehearsal, but felt she should not have said anything. Is he mindful of how speaking out has destroyed their lives once already? He doesn't want it to happen again.

After the dress rehearsal Kel and Sam return, argue, fight and – whether premeditated or not – Sam falls from their balcony to her death. Kel flees, meets Claudia, herself reeling from Michael's shock discovery of the affair, and the couple hole up at the Travellers' Inn. Despite everything that's happened, Kel honours his commitment to the play. Is he a man of his word, or simply mindful that fleeing completely would draw attention to him as a suspect in his wife's murder?

Tish Bhatoa via an associate

Bad blood between Sam Greenwood and Tish Bhatoa runs through their interconnected stories like a polluted river. Tish won the day in Bangui and, while she harbours resentment towards Sam for what she ‘tried to do’, there would be scant motivation for her to have Sam killed at this stage. Sam is openly antagonistic towards Tish – writing to her under her own name, questioning what Tish has told the Haywards, as if letting Tish know she is close and watching her. Nonetheless, Tish seems confident that truth is on her side and that Sam is not a threat.

However, the death of Dan Bhatoa in South Sudan changes that. Suddenly there is a reason for Tish to want deadly revenge. In Bangui, she supported her brother’s defence against Sam’s accusations of impropriety, and saw those charges dismissed, potentially having paid to make them go away. But as a result of the case, he was forced to move to less stable areas, where he perished. Dan and Tish won the battle, but lost the war. It is not without foundation that Tish blames Sam for his death.

But this is not all. From very early on in the Haywards’ appeal, Sam suspects Tish is not being honest with them. If the experimental drugs exist, and if Tish were intending to import them for Poppy, why would she not be open about where they came from? Tish has oppressive financial responsibilities. She pays for her parents’ expensive care home. Her businesses have cash-flow problems and she helps support Dan’s clinic. We believe that if Sam is right about Tish lying to the Haywards, then the threat of this being exposed, plus revenge for Dan’s death, could have led Tish to hire a mercenary to kill Sam while she is safely out of the country. This hitman climbed up the outside of the block and was waiting in the flat, or on the balcony, for Sam to return. Kel dropped her off and left to meet Claudia, without entering the flat. When Sam arrived home, she was confronted by the intruder and thrown off the balcony in a bid to make the death appear accidental or a suicide.

As for the identity of the intruder, we suggest Nick Walford, who is in the area the night of the murder, and the next day has very firm instructions for his mother regarding what to do with his bag.

Kevin MacDonald

Kevin and Sarah-Jane MacDonald have ploughed their time, energy and professionalism into Poppy’s appeal. If Sam is right, then they have been

conned by their oldest friends, and have been instrumental in further conning their families and everyone in their professional and friendship circles. That they fell for such a scam would be an appalling admission to make to everyone whose opinions matter. The shame is almost unimaginable.

It is after she tries, and fails, to confide in Sarah-Jane that Sam decides to spell out the situation to the entire Fairway Players. We believe this failure to engage Sarah-Jane is a direct result of Sam having posed as Clive Handler, a deception that counts against her from the moment the MacDonalds discover it.

While most members refuse to believe Sam's accusations and take the Haywards' side without question, once they are out in the open, Sarah-Jane *does* take them seriously. However, she focuses on what we believe to be the least likely or relevant of the accusations: that Helen lied about having a child before James, who died of meningitis. When Emma corroborates Helen's claim, Sarah-Jane and Kevin cling to this as evidence that everything Sam says is a lie. This is not necessarily the case . . .

Kevin, aware that Sam could be accurate in her interpretation of the appeal, and having involved so many of his Lodge associates, went to Sam's flat on the night of the dress rehearsal and killed her. This is while Sarah-Jane is at Emma's. She believes he is home in bed. We also believe he tells her afterwards. The MacDonalds have almost as much to lose as the Haywards if Sam's accusations go further than their immediate circle of friends.

Arnie Ballancore

Arnie is a lost soul long before he arrives in Lockwood. He has given up his nursing career, drifted around the world, become addicted to heroin and estranged from his family. However, the Greenwoods do not receive his mother's warning email. By the time they realise the extent of his problems, he has already stolen £6,000 – apparently most of the money they possess. As Kel gave him their PIN number on 25 June, it seems likely they would not be able to recover those funds from the bank. This prevents Sam fleeing back to Africa as soon as she discovers Kel's affair.

From his emails, Arnie comes across as a languid drifter, lost and lazy perhaps, but not a danger to anyone. However, we believe there is another side to him – the side that leads his mother to warn the Greenwoods how

much he has changed since they knew him in Africa. We see how he attempts to swindle Joyce at the tea counter during the Yogathon on 30 June, and riled Barry and Martin with uncontrolled verbal aggression. Yet the most telling observation on the character of Arnie comes on 4 July from Robert Green, the burglary victim who describes his 'savagery' and says he was 'easily the most aggressive' of his three attackers.

On 3 July Sam informs the police that Arnie was in possession of an African Healing Doll of the type stolen in the burglary, and also informs them he has taken their money. On the night of the murder, Arnie is released from police custody and makes his way back to the Greenwoods' flat. We believe he lets himself in, confronts Sam over informing on him or is confronted by her for stealing their money. In the midst of this confrontation we believe Arnie is unable to control his aggression, and the result is Sam's tragic death. He is seen leaving the next morning, with his rucksack, at 5 a.m.

These may be our prime suspects, but we have identified others – all with possible motives to kill Sam. Again, they are in no particular order.

Isabel Beck

As soon as they arrive in Lockwood, Isabel targets Sam and Kel as potential new friends. It is easy to use emotive language to describe her strategy: she 'sinks her claws' into them or 'latches on'. Yet much of her ensuing correspondence *does* denote obsession rather than true friendship. Isabel is socially isolated, lonely and lives for The Fairway Players. Much of her self-respect comes from her work, and we can see she's a dedicated nurse who likes to help and reassure others, even when that help and reassurance are not requested or valued. She proves herself to be very perceptive when she immediately identifies that Arnie is trouble. Of all the emails the Haywards receive following Poppy's diagnosis on 21 April, we feel Isabel's is the most appropriate.

Isabel has lost her friend Lauren – both emotionally, after Lauren's betrayal over the IV mistake, and literally, when Lauren left St Ann's and moved away with Josh. We believe Isabel sought to replace Lauren with Sam. Once she realises how much better her life is with Sam in it, she goes into overdrive, as if terrified she will lose her new friend, too. The arrival of Claudia makes Isabel take up her Blue Book again on 10 June and express

negative and aggressive emotions that do not find their way out through her other, copious correspondence.

Isabel is immature and socially awkward. She seems to experience difficulty talking to people, and others do not warm to her. She soon becomes emotionally dependent on Sam and attempts to isolate her from other potential friends, like Sarah-Jane and Helen. Therefore when Sam finally withdraws her friendship and support – in the car park after her outburst at the dress rehearsal – Isabel is distraught and incensed. Is this a case of ‘if I can’t have Sam, no one else will’? We believe Isabel follows Sam home that night and, Kel having left to meet Claudia at the Travellers’ Inn, enters the flat, where the pair fight and Sam is killed. Isabel’s correspondence in the twenty-four hours following Sam’s death is markedly different to all that’s gone before. To say nothing of her 999 call the following night, in which she seems to know precisely how long Sam has been lying under her balcony. Also telling is the swiftness with which Isabel seems to move on and look forward to life without Sam. She even offers to step into Sam’s role in *All My Sons*.

The Haywards: Martin, James, Glen

The men of the Hayward–Reswick dynasty are driven by three things: family, money and keeping their women in an infantile state of carefree bliss. If they are behind Sam’s murder, then we must assume that when she describes Poppy’s appeal as a ‘financial conspiracy’, Sam is right. If they are using the appeal money to support their failing businesses and maintain their lavish lifestyles, then their motivation for killing Sam would be to limit her accusations to their loyal social circle, where they are summarily dismissed.

If we assume this trio has a motive for wanting Sam out of the way, we need to consider where they all are the night she dies. James is with Olivia as she gives birth in St Ann’s. Martin cuts short the ill-fated dress rehearsal. Later that night he exchanges emails with Sarah-Jane, after which he writes to Sam, setting out his position on what she said and her future with The Fairway Players. We cannot say whether or not Glen was at the dress rehearsal. However, Paige says ‘Glen woke me up at four to go through Act One’. So Glen is up at 4 a.m. and knows then that Paige needs to take over Sam’s role in the play. However, we cannot be sure this is because he

knows she's dead, or because he knows she is likely to be out of the play. Either way, he's up at that key time.

The burglars

Sam informs on Arnie, who then gives the police the names of his criminal associates. Arnie may be an addict coerced into taking part in the crime to pay off a drugs debt, but the men behind it certainly appear to be bigger, more organised criminals. They plot to steal a painting, which means they have connections to the global criminal underworld, and this would place Sam in a dangerous position if they found out who went to the police. We are certain Arnie could be made to tell them who informed on him and where she lived. This may or may not have some co-relation to the fact that Arnie returns to the flat at some point during the night Sam is killed, and is seen leaving for good very early the next morning.

Suicide/accident

Like Kel and Arnie, Sam has struggled to settle since her return from Africa. She is ill with Hepatitis C, which she must keep secret from her employer. She is stuck in a failing ward with a poor atmosphere; her work colleague is needy, clingy and obsessed; her husband is leaving her for someone she thought was a friend; and a man she tried to help has stolen her money, making her escape impossible. She has tried to fit into a community that turns on her the moment she attempts to stop them falling for a fraud. And there is one other major factor we discovered: the drug Sam is taking – Ribavirin – has a rare side-effect: 'thoughts of suicide'. Did Sam return to her flat the night of the dress rehearsal, full of despair over her personal life, as well as her thwarted attempts to help others and put right what is wrong in the world? If so, then the influence of Ribavirin could have contributed to her final, fatal, impulsive decision.

Meanwhile, any of the above suspects may have caused Sam's death, but purely by accident. The night of the 4–5 July was warm and balmy. If the balcony doors were open, then it is quite possible any fight could have ended up there, with tragic consequences for Sam.

Have we missed anything? Good call re Ribavirin btw.

Charlotte

Why are Martin/James/Glen only outside suspects? Should be near the top.

Femi

See Martin's emails to SJ and Sam after her outburst. He sounds so open, honest, fair. Not running scared, or defensive because he's just been found out.

Charlotte

You still think Bhatoa is behind the fraud behind the appeal?

Femi

Yes. But Nick Walford? Tenuous.

Charlotte

Sam is on to *something*. Her outburst is a catalyst, but to what?

Femi

'One does not exist at all.' Well, someone who doesn't exist in this correspondence is Helen.

Charlotte

Sam and Kel too . . .

Femi

Sure, but we know they send emails, as we have replies addressed to them.

Charlotte

Ok. Where are you going with that?

Femi

The Haywards, the play they're putting on. Despite everything – from Poppy's illness to Sam's accusations – *nothing* gets in the way of the play and it's all about Helen. Helen this, Helen that, everyone loves Helen. Martin: she's our leading lady onstage and off. James: if there isn't a significant female role, The Fairway Players won't choose that play. His mum 'belongs onstage'. Issy:

she's so larger than life that if she's in a scene, no one else is. Kevin: she lives in a wonderland where she's forever centre-stage. If Helen is such a brilliant actor who delivers an 'impeccable performance' with such 'intensity of commitment' to her 'demanding role' – then WHO IS THIS WOMAN?

Charlotte

Good point. Sam suspects Helen of something . . . Why consult a genealogist?

Femi

The character who 'does not exist at all' could be Helen's little boy, like Sam says. She tells Martin she's a bereaved mother when she meets him, then lives the lie. Paige and James believe it.

Charlotte

Her emotional reaction to Sam's revelation could be a genuine response to her lie being exposed. Or just another act. Would this give her a motive to kill Sam?

Femi

Don't forget Paige. She and Helen are 'so alike'. Both obsessed with themselves and the stage. Both protected from reality by their partners. Both in it together?

Femi and Charlotte's Breakdown of Theories

So Martin's an addict.

Charlotte

Gambler. Letter on 11 June from Gamblers Anonymous. There's a reference on 21 May to him betting. Reacts badly when James makes a casual remark. He's a man with debts.

Femi

And a risk-taker. Despite seeming cautious and level-headed. He has a City background, and the financial world is just gambling, no? Also, could be a response to stress.

Charlotte

Debts are not always paid in money. Like Arnie and Sharkey. Bhatoa covers her back by jetting to Bangui while she blackmails Martin into doing her dirty work re Sam.

Femi

Their convo is *not* about Poppy's drugs. A code?

Charlotte

Her remorse seems genuine. But is it for not believing Sam over Dan, or for having Sam killed when she was right all along?

Femi

'Stay away from the Haywards.' Threat or warning? Or insurance if/when the police come knocking?

Charlotte

Claudia doesn't include Sam in her family 'chat' about the future. She must know she's dead.

Femi

Claudia and Issy each claim to be Sam's bestie, but move on immediately once she's gone. Literally don't look back.

Charlotte

Arnie is out of the frame IMO. I think he goes back to the flat. It's empty. Sam's dead outside, the killer gone. He stays the night, leaves early. None the wiser.

Femi

So who was it?

Charlotte

The MacDonalds. Kel wrongly convicted.

Femi

Martin, acting on behalf of Bhatoa. MacDonalds wrongly convicted.

Charlotte

MacDonalds guilty. Issy wrongly convicted. They frame her.

Femi

Claudia guilty. Kel wrongly convicted, because he confessed to protect her.

Charlotte

Arrrghh! Where's the evidence? We're supposed to analyse the correspondence, not just make up stories.

Femi

Let's see what Tanner says about our doc. Really wish I hadn't put 'precipice' in the first line. Too emotional, melodramatic. Should have said 'edge'. Words are so important.

Dear both,

I have read your document. There is a prize waiting for whoever solved the riddle of Topps Tiles. Yes, you are correct. That venerable ceramics emporium is visible from the small, north-facing window of the Greenwoods' lounge, situated in a recess above their Ikea desk, which Isabel admires so much. When she muses 'I can see Topps Tiles' she *must* be sitting down at the desk to see the sign. Her email coincides with a message Michael D'Souza claims he received from Sam's email address, informing him that his wife Claudia is having an affair with Kel Greenwood. Isabel deleted the sent file immediately and blocked Michael's email address, so that Sam would not receive any further emails from him. Michael deleted the received file, so this correspondence is not available.

A close second prize goes to whoever discovered the side-effects of Ribavirin.

However, you need to go back through the correspondence and think again about who does not exist at all. It's a matter of corroboration.

Overall, good work, but there is one angle you did not touch upon. The question of who *benefits* most from Sam's death. I believe this is more important than who stands to lose the most from her revelations. There are four primary motives for murder: love/sex, money, silence and revenge. Revenge is fourth for a reason. A murder motivated purely by revenge is uncommon, because the *benefits* are vague, intangible, of negligible worth. Most people who plan and – pardon the pun – execute the death of another do so in *anticipation* of something positive occurring as a result, rather than as an empty *reaction* to something already in the past.

We will discuss these matters tomorrow.

PS I should tell you who is imprisoned – I believe, erroneously. It is Isabel Beck.

Femi

So it seemed, beyond reasonable doubt, to be Isabel. That's curious. Apart from appearing to be an empathetic personality, how does she benefit from Sam's death?

Charlotte

Hardly anyone *likes* Issy. We only see her emails. There has to be *something* about her. Something we don't pick up on, through the correspondence.

Femi

Lauren likes her. James likes her. As far as we can tell, Sam likes her at first. The Fairway Players like her enough to cast her in two plays.

Charlotte

The community turns on the least-popular, least-integrated individual and makes them fit the crime? We see Sarah-Jane and Kevin do just that, perhaps because they killed Sam, but not necessarily. They *want* it to be Issy because they see everyone else as a friend.

Femi

Could Issy's fixation with Sam lead a jury to believe she could have killed her to move on in her life, free of the obsession? She moves on instantly, we can see that.

Charlotte

I still think the MacDonalds frame Issy. They grow closer as a couple over the course of events, don't you think? Something sinister in the way SJ watches Issy text Lauren in the green room.

Femi

So, the person who doesn't exist at all *corroborates* something and

we haven't spotted it. Any thoughts?

Charlotte

Emma corroborates Helen's story for Sarah-Jane.

Femi

Emma must be real. Martin emails her about Woof.

Charlotte

Woof! Does Woof exist? Fuck, is that whole thing about the vets a code for something else?

Femi

If it is, then Sarah-Jane must be in on it. And her mother. No, both are mentioned by other people.

Charlotte

A code! Code, code, code. I made a note of this when you mentioned it before. Give me a minute. Don't message, I'll get distracted.

Femi

Ok. Go for it.

Charlotte

This is it. A code. A simple one between Tish and Martin *only*. Imagine that when they talk about 'phials' they mean 'files'. 'The contents of the phials will oxidise in two months, so I would recommend paying sooner rather than later.' The contents of the files will be exposed (things 'oxidise' when exposed to the air) in two months. So pay up.

Charlotte

On 23 June: 'The phials are still in Boston and can't be secured until you complete payment. I'm concerned Poppy's health will decline further if there's any more delay.' Secured – kept closed, out of sight. There will be consequences if you don't pay.

Charlotte

'The phials will last a bit longer but I am concerned the delay will prove detrimental to the integrity of the contents.' She's prepared to wait, but whatever is in the files will be worse when exposed.

Charlotte

Martin's only reference to the 'phials' in his correspondence with Tish comes after Sam has accused them of a financial conspiracy: 'I suggest we delay shipping of the phials until this latest furore has blown over.' He wants to suspend their arrangement until Sam is out of the way. Shit! Blown over – over the balcony . . .

Charlotte

I say this: there are no experimental drugs. Poppy is having NHS treatment at Mount More via Bhatoa's private practice. However, there is no financial conspiracy, either. Tish is blackmailing Martin. She's helping him raise funds, and is colluding in the deception of the community, but all the money is going to her. That's why Martin is in such a fucking financial mess.

Femi

Charl, you're on fire. Bhatoa has form here. In her email on 3 May she threatens to tell St Ann's the 'real reason' Sam had to return from Africa. She knows she has Hepatitis C. What could Tish know about Martin? That he's a gambler?

Charlotte

The Haywards arrive at Tish's private practice with a very sick little girl and a determination to cure her. Tish does her research into Martin's business affairs via Noel Burton from RedHawk Consulting and spots an opportunity. What does she dig up? A dodgy deal, tax evasion, debts, an affair maybe? My main point is: Lydia Drake is a scam, but it's *Martin* scamming *Tish* – to divert at least some of Poppy's appeal money back to himself. At first he tries to reconnect with Clive Handler behind Tish's back, but Sam has already deleted the email account. So Lydia Drake is born. He sends the emails from Magda's computer at The Grange – to give him something to forward on to SJ. Only Martin isn't particularly creative. He gets the name Lydia from *All My Sons*; Drake from the script publisher – look back at SJ's message to him on 20 April. She complains about the cost of the Drake Classics version of the script. When he realises SJ and Kevin can trace emails, he panics and early next morning deletes them to cover his tracks – to the dismay of the entirely innocent Magda.

Femi

Good work. See, you *can* do this, Charl.

Charlotte

Let's say I'm correct. Tish knows something inflammatory about Martin. Well, James and Glen must know it, too. Helen and Paige, as ever, in the dark. Surely he'd want to keep it from James and Glen too, if it were 'just' an affair or gambling? Must be something bigly illegal . . .

Femi

So, park SJ and Kevin. That makes the Haywards our main suspects – Sam doesn't know about the blackmail, but if she exposes the appeal as a fraud, then she will inadvertently expose whatever Tish knows about the Haywards.

Charlotte

How does Issy end up in jail?

Femi

The MacDonalds could still frame her. They don't necessarily know what's in the 'files' or that the files exist. But they are tight with the Haywards. They will protect the alpha family on instinct.

Yes, Martin Hayward is now our prime suspect. Glen and James his accomplices. Isabel framed and convicted because she's a relative outsider obsessed with the victim.

Charlotte

We believe the appeal is a financial conspiracy, in so far as it's a vehicle for Tish Bhatoa to blackmail Martin. Martin makes up the Lydia Drake fraud to divert £80k of the appeal money away from Tish. He has to pay his builders sooner than expected, on top of which he has legal fees and a gambling habit.

Good. Who benefits from Sam's death?

Charlotte

The Haywards, Tish, the MacDonalds all benefit from Sam's silence.

Femi

Kel. He's free to be with Claudia. Vice versa. Isabel. She's free from her obsession and can move on.

Roderick Tanner, QC

I said three people pretend to be others. You correctly identify one as Sam – she pretends to be Isabel to access Mount More's treatment records. Also, Isabel sends an email as Sam. I believe there is another, pivotal masquerade, in plain sight, much later on. Clive Handler and Lydia Drake are not who they say they are – along with one other. Which brings me to the one who does not exist at all.

Charlotte

Can I ask: how did 'who's who?' affect the original case?

Roderick Tanner, QC

It contributed to the miscarriage of justice. I believe. Posing as someone else betrays a propensity to deceive.

Femi

So it involves Isabel, one of these deceptions?

Roderick Tanner, QC

Yes, one of them.

Femi

Mr Tanner, is there something we should know about Isabel? From her correspondence, she has an empathetic personality. She's kind, friendly, optimistic and simple, in a good way. She's shy and lonely and suffers from depression, she's socially awkward, but even so, why would she ever be considered a suspect, let alone convicted?

Charlotte

Her major 'crime' is her obsession with Sam. But she's not serious stalker material.

Femi

She's not intelligent enough to plan a murder.

Really? Well, she's intelligent enough to fool both of you.

Roderick Tanner, QC

Go back and read through the correspondence again. This time, bear in mind that Lauren Malden is really Isabel. See how that changes your perspective.

Femi

Lauren? Wasn't she at the ball? What about her mum and Josh?

Charlotte

Just to be clear, Mr Tanner: there was *never* anyone called Lauren? Not working at St Ann's, not in The Fairway Players?

Roderick Tanner, QC

Never. Lauren Malden does not and never has existed. Nor anyone related to her. Call it an alter ego, if you like.

Femi

Isabel emails *herself* as an imaginary friend she's fallen out with? Someone who betrayed her and then jogged off with a boyfriend?

Charlotte

Man, that's fucked-up.

She's a complex creation.

Charlotte

Sorry, Mr Tanner. I didn't mean to use that language, I'm on voice.

We believe Lauren replaced the Blue Book for Isabel. Look at the emails and see if you can understand why. Well, I've given that away, but won't tell you anything else. Go back and see how this new information influences your list of suspects. Don't forget the masquerade you haven't seen yet.

Charlotte

So she's created Lauren. It's weird, but there are others with more credible motives; it still doesn't make Isabel an obvious suspect in Sam's murder.

Roderick Tanner, QC

Indeed. Quite possibly she wouldn't have been, if it were not for one thing. She confessed.

Roderick Tanner, QC

What's more, she maintains to this day that she did it. I'll forward the transcript.

Femi

Is there evidence she is innocent?

Roderick Tanner, QC

That's what I'm asking you.

County Police Interview Report

Extract from police interview with Isabel Beck:

Ms Anand: I'd like to read a prepared statement.

Sgt Cooper: Go ahead.

Ms Anand: My name is Isabel Beck. On the night of 4–5 July 2018 I was responsible for the death of Samantha Greenwood. After The Fairway Players' dress rehearsal for *All My Sons* I caught a bus to Sam's flat, with the intention of discussing our forthcoming trip to Africa. When I arrived we argued and she fell over the balcony. I panicked and ran home. I hoped she was ok, but noticed she did not come in to work the next day. Nor did she arrive at the church hall for the performance of the play that night, 5 July. After the play I was given a lift to Sam's flat by Joel and Celia Halliday. There, I discovered Sam's body lying under the balcony and called 999.

Sgt Cooper: Thank you. Isabel, did Samantha Greenwood know you were coming to the flat on the night of the 4th, after the dress rehearsal?

Ms Beck: No comment.

Sgt Cooper: Only, you were seen with Ms Greenwood after the rehearsal. In the words of this witness, 'Sam snarled in Isabel's ear as if she were furious with her. Sam marched off and Isabel was left alone in the car park. She [meaning you] looked utterly devastated.' Is that correct?

Ms Beck: No comment.

Sgt Crowe: What did Sam say that was so bad you pushed her over the balcony?

Ms Anand: That isn't in the statement. Ms Beck does not say she pushed Ms Greenwood over the balcony.

Sgt Crowe: What did you argue about that was so bad Ms Greenwood ended up falling over the balcony?

Ms Beck: No comment.

Sgt Cooper: You say your intention, in going to Ms Greenwood's flat that night, was to discuss a trip to Africa with her. Only there was no trip planned, was there?

Ms Beck: No comment.

Sgt Cooper: Ms Greenwood was making her own plans to return to Africa as a volunteer with Médecins Sans Frontières. You were not part of that.

Ms Beck: No comment.

Sgt Cooper: Is that what she told you in the car park?

Ms Beck: No comment.

Sgt Cooper: Or was it something else?

Ms Beck: No comment.

Sgt Cooper: As we've seen from the CCTV footage, you took the bus, at night, all the way across Lockwood for a reason. There was no trip. So why go?

Ms Beck: No comment.

Sgt Cooper: Why not text or email?

Ms Beck: No comment.

Sgt Cooper: You could speak to her at work the next day. Why go to her flat, there and then?

Ms Beck: No comment.

Sgt Cooper: If you won't tell us, then we might assume you went there intending to cause harm to Ms Greenwood, because that's what it looks like. Can you see our problem?

Sgt Crowe: Did you go to Ms Greenwood's flat on the night of 4 July with the intention to kill her?

Ms Beck: No comment.

Charlotte

People confess all the time. They aren't convicted.

Femi

Exactly. *Corpus delicti*. There must be evidence she did it.

Charlotte

Tanner implies there's no evidence she didn't.

Femi

If there's a murder and someone who has opportunity and motive

holds their hands up and says they're guilty, how much effort does anyone put into finding out if they really are?

Charlotte

So, if we say Isabel is innocent – what's her motive for confessing?

Femi

Attention. Her name linked to Sam's, part of her ongoing obsession.

Charlotte

Covering for someone else?

Femi

Who and why? And when does she decide to cover for them? Right after the murder she's looking forward to the future . . . She hasn't factored in ten years of jail time.

Charlotte

Shock. It happens. People experience something terrible, like killing their best friend, and then carry on as normal.

Femi

We need to go back and read Issy's email exchanges with Lauren.

Charlotte

Denial! That's the word. Yes, let's reread . . .

Charlotte

Finished yet? I can't believe we didn't see it. On 17 April 'Lauren' says 'all-nighters at my age, boo'. Boo! Issy says that all the time.

Femi

When you know Lauren is really Issy, you can see how she plays on her own fears and allays them.

Charlotte

She's created someone to hold a grudge against. For dropping her in favour of a boyfriend; for betraying her at work; for only contacting her when she wants gossip; for leaving. Those early emails between them – Issy is so offhand and cool.

Femi

She creates someone even lower down the social ladder than she is.

Charlotte

Lauren tells Issy things her 'mum' has heard, when really Issy overheard them. So instead of eavesdropping, Issy gives herself the higher status of being told: *e.g.* builders at The Grange. Issy mentions watching yoga on YouTube in an email to Sam on 30 June, and by 2 July Lauren is suddenly writing to Issy about spiritual issues.

Femi

With Lauren she has conversations she doesn't have with anyone in real life. We don't even know if Sam converses with her at this level of intimacy. Most have no time for her.

Charlotte

Lauren boosts Issy's confidence by reinforcing what she wants to be true. Like having friends or being right for a part in the play. She blames Lauren for the mistake she made at work. So instead of feeling a failure, she convinces herself she's a martyr.

Femi

It's weird. Yet nothing in Lauren's emails makes me think Issy is or isn't guilty.

Charlotte

That could be the problem. It just doesn't look good. Someone who emails an imaginary friend could be seen as unstable enough to kill someone who rejects them in real life. Especially when they confess to it.

Femi

Do we know why Tanner is so keen on this case? Seems personal.

Roderick Tanner, QC

Acting on evidence available at the time, he was instrumental in convincing Isabel to plead guilty to murder. He now needs to reach the truth. So yes, it's personal. Thus far we are looking to reduce her sentence to manslaughter. However, I believe she is entirely innocent. But I need bright, intelligent people to see what I see before I can act.

Femi

Sorry, Mr Tanner, I didn't realise you were still here.

Charlotte

Mr Tanner. Can I ask, what is Isabel like, as a person?

Roderick Tanner, QC

I would describe her as a survivor. We tend to consider survivors as strong and heroic. The reality is never as pretty or noble. Some survive because they deceive, some because they delude themselves. Others refuse to engage with reality.

Femi

Which is Isabel?

Roderick Tanner, QC

I'll send through some correspondence from after Ms Greenwood's body is discovered. We'll meet Friday as usual.

It is with great shock and sadness that I must report the sudden death of Samantha Greenwood. I am unaware of the details, but as many of you already know, Sam was very distressed on Wednesday and left the rehearsal quite distraught. We wondered why she did not arrive for the play last night,

and it now seems she passed away suddenly, very shortly after leaving us. I know everyone will join me in sending our heartfelt condolences to Kel.

While Paige replaced Sam in the play before we realised what had happened, it now seems only right to continue with the production, both in the spirit of 'the show must go on' and as a tribute to Sam and the work she put into rehearsals over the last few months. She was a new member, so we did not know her well, but she was a friendly and enthusiastic person who showed great promise as an actor. She will be sadly missed.

Kel has valiantly agreed to continue in his role for the remaining production nights. May I extend our sincere thanks to him, and urge all our members to rally round and support him, as I know you all will, at what must be a most sad and challenging time. Regards, Martin Hayward

She worshipped Sam, followed her around, bought things for her, latched on with an iron grip. Well, when Sam stormed out of the dress rehearsal, Issy followed her. Moments later I went outside myself and saw them. Sam had a hold of Issy's arm and was snarling in her ear. I couldn't hear what was said, but Issy looked devastated. She went back inside, collected her bag and left. The next day she emails Martin, all bright and breezy, and offers to play Sam's role herself! I think Issy followed Sam home that night and killed her. Should I go to the police?
Sarah-Jane MacDonald

Femi

Again, Martin is very calm in the face of a crisis.

Charlotte

Tish withdraws from their arrangement. But Martin calls it a desertion. Was it really blackmail? He seems a willing victim.

Femi

It's an exchange of some sort, but with a power imbalance. Martin needs Tish more than she needs him.

Charlotte

SJ wants everyone to see Issy as guilty.

Femi

I'm going to say that the final person 'not who they say they are' is Helen. I think Sam found out who she really is and that somehow led to her death.

Charlotte

Where's the evidence?

Femi

Sam was consulting Andrea specifically about Helen. Andrea 'Andy' says 'tread carefully' because even doctors can be fooled. They 'have to say something'. Sam was killed when she said something.

Charlotte

Just like in Africa. Only there she's sent away. Here, where it's supposedly more 'civilised', she's killed.

Femi

Two communities, one raising money to cure a sick child, the other healing victims of war. Both so kind and caring, so intent on doing what they believe is right. Yet both refuse to see what's wrong. Their solution is to silence the person pointing it out.

Femi

Because the alternative is to acknowledge the shame. Of enabling abuse, of hailing an abuser as a hero, of reducing a continent to a primitive war zone, of falling for a scam, of being conned by

friends, or conning your friends in turn. All these things are not easy to acknowledge.

Charlotte

I know you have strong feelings about Western aid in Africa. Don't let it affect your impartiality in this case. What do you always say to me about letting emotions get in the way?

Femi

Because what do you do, once you've acknowledged it? How do you atone for something like that? It's not a simple case of paying the money back. Pouring cash into aid, or trying to pick up the pieces. The damage is done. Money won't repair broken trust. There are some things you can't un-know, says Andy. Well, there are some things that cannot be forgiven.

Charlotte

Let's see what Tanner says on Friday.

Femi

We've nearly got this. There's just something we haven't seen yet. I'll read through everything again tonight.

Femi

Wake up!

Femi

Come on, wake up!

Femi

Charl, are you awake? I've got it – what Tanner was talking about. This changes everything.

Charlotte

Yep. What?

Femi

That night of the dress rehearsal Sam tells the whole Fairway Players everything she's found out about Helen and Martin, plus everything she's discovered, courtesy of her own medical knowledge and that of her acquaintances. It shocks everyone. Not what she says, but *because* she says it. This community is not in the habit of questioning the Haywards. Whatever they may know or suspect, they would rather continue enabling the deception than challenge it. They all reject Sam there and then, except Issy. Sam rejects Issy outside in the car park. From that moment Sam is alone. That evening Martin emails Sam and Sarah-Jane. He addresses Sam's outburst and discusses the play.

Charlotte

Ok, we've established all that.

Femi

He's calm, he's fair, he's in charge – because Sam has shown her hand and she *doesn't* have the one thing he fears everyone seeing. Sam arrives home to the message from Andy, calls her back and discovers what it is. She has to tell *someone*. She calls Martin and tells him. More about this in a second. Go back a few weeks . . .

Femi

Sam is hot on the case of a suspected 'financial conspiracy', courtesy of her inherent distrust of Tish Bhatoa and, quite possibly, her outsider's perspective on this little community and the Haywards' status at the top of it. She engages Andy to find out if Helen is lying about having a little boy who died. But she can't afford a full search, so asks her to check records of death only. No record of his death *in the UK*. Sam takes from this that the little boy never lived, that it's an emotive lie to raise sympathy and money. She's almost right, but wrong.

Femi

Andy is intrigued by the case, or maybe she just likes Sam – who knows. For some reason she continues to look into Helen's history. But she's not the first. Remember Tish and her due diligence? We assumed she dug into Martin's business history, but Helen is co-director of The Grange, and the company Tish employed to investigate their finances automatically studies *her* background, too. Andy looks 'across the pond' and, like Tish, discovers that Helen had a little boy who died – only he didn't have meningitis: he had a mother who made him ill deliberately to gain attention for herself, until one day, tragically, she killed him.

Charlotte

Munchausen's by proxy? They call it 'Fabricated or Induced Illness' now. It would be less well known then . . . not spotted until it was too late. That is so fucking tragic.

Femi

This is what's in the 'files' Tish Bhatoa has: files from the US, where Helen was born and where she was arrested for the murder of her eldest child. Like the newspaper review says, her American accent is so convincing it could be real.

Charlotte

Femi, are you saying what I think you are?

Charlotte

Was she tried and convicted?

Femi

Perhaps, perhaps not, but there is enough evidence in the 'files' to throw a whole new light on this charismatic woman everyone loves, respects and protects.

Femi

Not only are there *no* experimental drugs, but also Poppy isn't ill *at all*.

Femi

And whatever Helen tried to do to her first child, she started doing to Poppy.

Charlotte

SHIT! Where's the evidence?

Femi

It all hinges on what Sam is doing when she accesses the database at Mount More. Only she doesn't realise it at the time. Also, check out the words Martin uses to describe the effect Poppy's cancer will have on their family. He repeats the phrase 'legacy of tragedy' that will 'scar' his family forever. Both are direct quotes

from a genuine letter describing the death of a child from cancer. Given that his granddaughter does *not* have, and never has had, terminal cancer, it's his only source of reference for such emotion. I've got pages of notes – sending you an email . . .

TO: Charlotte Holroyd
SUBJECT: New theory continued
FROM: Femi Hassan

Tanner told us the person who doesn't exist is a matter of corroboration. When we heard it was Lauren, we assumed it related to Isabel. Her existence as an imaginary friend *is* a character witness for Isabel after all, and probably led her to be found guilty. However, I believe he meant us to notice what Lauren corroborates about *Poppy*. I've been through this entire correspondence again and again – there is *no* independent evidence that Poppy is ill and actually having chemotherapy, other than from Lauren on 24 April and 31 May, or to put it more accurately, what Isabel, with her better-than-average medical knowledge, has *made up*. The Haywards, Reswicks and Tish Bhatoa are actively involved in the deception – there's no corroborative reference to her Hickman line, chemo sessions, nothing. In fact we know Paige shaves Poppy's hair off on 2 July so she can wear her wig.

When Sam gains access to the treatment records at Mount More, she is gone a long time. Only she doesn't find Poppy's notes, because there are none, so something *else* must keep her at that database. I believe it is Paige's notes. She discovers that, as a child, Paige was hospitalised multiple times with minor complaints and conditions. Others have mentioned this in their correspondence, too: on 9 June, Marianne Payne tells Carol Dearing that 'I remember Paige was poorly early on, with asthma first, then a stomach problem'. Sam mentions Paige's medical history in passing to Andy, who struggles to find records for Helen under the name we know her by. It isn't until Andy broadens her search and tracks her to the US that the truth starts to emerge. 'You mentioned something about the mum being ill . . . I took a gamble across the pond and found something.'

Sam's mistake is to assume Martin doesn't realise his wife has a history of this psychological condition. I believe he not only knows, but uses it to create a situation he and Tish can exploit financially. We've seen how the

family shelters Helen from the stress of reality – I think this is to keep her symptoms at bay. When Martin is in a dire situation himself, with his gambling addiction, financial worries from Olivia's IVF and legal issues at The Grange, he can't keep that stress from Helen. Imagine that she starts to act out again, this time with Poppy.

As Helen fabricates Poppy's symptoms, Martin must do something and fast. Seeking help for his wife doesn't occur to him, because it means acknowledging the awful truth of her condition and her history. So he looks for a doctor with overwhelming financial commitments, because they are more likely to be seduced by the promise of easy money. He finds Tish; with her parents in a five-star care home, her brother in Africa draining her finances and a fluctuating business income, she's the ideal collaborator. He asks her to 'pretend' to treat Poppy, yet ensure Helen doesn't damage the child's health. In return for compromising her professional integrity, Tish will benefit from the fundraising appeal that he intends to use as a solution to his financial problems, too.

On 6 July he describes himself as 'managing a situation'. I believe he's managed this situation for years, since he found out about Helen's condition when Paige was a child. Sarah-Jane says they started The Fairway Players when Paige was a toddler, and according to Marianne, this is the point when her health apparently improved. Once Helen had a place to be centre-stage, where she could express her attention-seeking side, she stopped making her daughter ill. The Fairway Players is an important community group, but its significance to the Haywards is far greater: it keeps them functioning as a close and loving family.

This situation doesn't occur to Sam. Why would it? She's heard from Issy that Lauren and her mum have seen Poppy being treated at Mount More. Who would make their own child or grandchild ill anyway? Which brings me to Paige. We've seen how close mother and daughter are. Could they suffer from the same psychological make-up? Did the fact Paige was abused like that – made ill by her own mother as a child, in an environment where that situation was not challenged or addressed – somehow inform a pattern of behaviour now? She certainly shares a love of the spotlight with Helen, and similarly she's kept in her own happy world by the rest of the family.

So Martin nurtures a scenario that Helen and Paige play into. It's all so that he can start the appeal for non-existent experimental drugs and raise the

cash he so desperately needs. Only it soon becomes more than he can handle. Martin does not realise quite how far the community will go to help him and his family. The appeal explodes into a flurry of activity and a deluge of cash. With this comes more lies, more deception, even more stress, and more problematic management issues, not least Tish.

Martin confides in Tish about his wife's condition, but she does her own 'due diligence' and turns this wealthy family's explosive secret to her own advantage. She probes their background using RedHawk Consulting, discovers Helen's true identity and secures evidence of her involvement in the death of her first child. It is the one thing the family does not want their friends to know.

Knowledge is power, and Tish uses hers to ensure she is the sole beneficiary of the appeal. They are soon dependent on each other in the worst way. For the record, I don't believe Poppy is given drugs when she goes for 'chemo' – Tish fabricates the whole process. She even makes Poppy feel poorly on 2 July to reassure Paige the chemo is working. When she withdraws her participation, Martin says, 'Poppy needs treatment of some sort' as if Helen and Paige will not be happy unless the little girl is having medical care.

So is Martin acting alone, or are James and Glen part of this, too? I suspect they know about it from the off. Glen, who believes the meningitis story, is on board with what he thinks is a quick fix to bail the family out of their temporary financial straits – of which his failure to find work is key; on 22 May he is emailed by Ben Taylor, saying that his contract will not be renewed. Meanwhile James is reluctant. I wonder if he would prefer his mother to seek professional help for her condition? In their early correspondence James and Martin are cool with each other, as in ice-fucking-cold. On 19 May James says to Issy: 'I never wanted to be a part of this. I tried to talk them out of doing it in the first place.' We thought he meant the play, but it's the appeal – the deception – he is drawn into against his will.

James refuses to attend Poppy's Ball. The family lies about the reason. They say he and Olivia are babysitting Poppy, when Beth Halliday is doing that. I've tried to identify the moment James is forced to engage with his father's plan. It's when Sam visits Martin with her theory that Tish is lying to them. On 1 June Martin says, 'I don't know what to do or which way to turn. I'm sorry about everything else. I know how you feel but we need you

on our side.’ For a man like Martin, that is serious emotional stuff. James is a part of it from then. It’s against his better judgement, but he’s aware his IVF is part of the problem and that his whole family’s health, wealth and future happiness now depends on the deception, the appeal and the play.

It’s James who insists Sam and Kel are excluded from the fundraising committee, and James who says, ‘Don’t reply, Dad, leave it to me’ when Sarah-Jane objects. That’s it. Martin now relies on James for emotional support and practical help. But when James is called away to an ailing Olivia on 5 July, the somewhat less-articulate Glen is required to do his bit for the family and email Sarah-Jane. So, having said all this: Who killed Samantha Greenwood? **Martin Hayward**, to stop the family secret being exposed.

Who knew it was going to happen? **Glen Reswick**, who helps Martin and effectively takes James’s place while James is with Olivia at the hospital.

Who knew about it before her body was discovered? **James Hayward**, because Martin tells him once the twins are born.

Who is erroneously imprisoned and why? **Isabel Beck**, because she is a quiet, awkward outsider at the bottom of the social hierarchy, with a well-documented obsession and a complex psychological life. For some reason, she also happened to be at Sam’s flat that night.

Charlotte

There’s no suggestion Helen made *James* ill as a child?

Femi

No. But Martin had a job in the City at that time. Let’s say Helen felt secure enough then to function normally. It’s when things get rocky that she starts again.

Charlotte

Ok. But the actual murderer could be any combination of the Martin/Glen/James triangle.

Femi

Theoretically. But James is at the hospital with Olivia and the

twins. He's out of the picture the whole night. Glen wakes Paige at 4 a.m. with news she's got Sam's part in the play. But I don't believe Glen has Martin's motivation. We can't account for Martin after he's sent the emails to Sam and SJ. He describes the whole thing as a 'bloody mess' to James the next day. But I also don't think they know for sure Sam is dead at that point – even if they suspect it.

Charlotte

James asks Issy if she's seen Sam. She says 'no'. A one-word email from Issy? That says more than any of her rambling missives. Why was she at Sam's flat that night? She doesn't tell the police the reason.

Femi

This is what we need to establish. Perhaps she intends to speak to her about what they discuss in the car park. The next day she tells Celia and Joel she has something for Kel.

Charlotte

That's a lie. She wants to 'discover' the body and call the police. We keep hearing how Helen loves to be centre-stage. Well, so does Issy. Even says she can't wait to be 'back onstage in the spotlight'.

Femi

Has she arranged with the Haywards to find the body? James and Issy are closer than they themselves realise. They have quite a bond. He confides in her when he wants info about Sam, when he says 'I never wanted to be a part of this.' He defends Issy several times, to Sarah-Jane and Martin. James is an outsider in his family – does he identify with Issy, the social outsider? Tanner describes Issy as 'a survivor', but not in a good way. Does she delude herself that she's acting for the best, for the benefit of her friend James and the alpha family?

Charlotte

What is it James says to Issy after the murder? 'Thanks again for your support. You're a vital member of our team.'

Femi

We're no nearer the 'who's-who' thing Tanner is so keen on. If the

third person 'not who they say they are' is Helen, then I have no idea 'who pretends to be who' later on. No idea.

Charlotte

We need to think on that, and why Issy is at Sam's the night of the murder.

Femi

Let's see what Tanner says. We may have got there without needing the who's-who thing.

Dear both,

Further to our meeting today: thank you. You have identified what I believe to be the crux of this case and now we can move forward. To recap: Helen is the final character not who they say they are. Records are patchy, but we know she was born Helen Macauley-Grace in Boxborough, a well-to-do suburb of Boston, Massachusetts, in 1956. She marries a Kenneth Anderson in February 1973. In August 1973 David Kenneth Anderson is born. The child dies in October 1978 of renal failure and breathing complications. Helen Anderson is charged with Voluntary Manslaughter after doctors report their suspicions to the coroner, whose Open Verdict stands to this day. The trial takes place in 1979. Evidence is overwhelming, yet circumstantial. Helen's display of grief in the witness box is, by all accounts, riveting. Doubts fester. Sympathy flows. A technicality is raised. The judge stops the trial. Helen is a free woman, but there is too much evidence for her reputation to survive in that small community. Her marriage is dissolved in 1979 and she makes a new start, in a new country.

By 1980 a Helen Anderson is living not far from here in Lymbridge, although it is Helen Grace who marries Martin Hayward in 1981. James is born in 1982 and Paige in 1985. Do they know their mother has a past life in America? Clearly the subject of the older brother has arisen, but whether they know the full story is yet to be established. When did Martin discover the truth? Probably years after falling in love and starting a family with a woman whose act he believed. By then it was too late.

You've worked hard, and I feel we are very nearly there, but not quite. As promised, attached is the explanation Isabel gave for her journey to the Greenwoods' flat the night of the dress rehearsal. It explains much about how the relationship between Samantha and Isabel ended. As usual with this case, the meat is all between the lines.

Isabel's conviction for murder hangs on whether she intended to kill Samantha or not. There is a quiet confidence we'll commute to manslaughter. However, I believe Isabel did not even enter the

Greenwoods' flat that night. Someone else did. That's why this appeal is so crucial.

You've put forward a good argument for Martin Hayward, but read his statement attached and see if you feel the same way. As you've come this far in the dark, to a degree, I've included a few other statements you will find interesting. I have not relinquished my quest for you to see the final masquerade. I believe it is crucial.

I cannot meet up again before the deadline, so please use The What's Up to communicate your thoughts. Thereby, please liaise with Sandra.

Extract from police interview with Isabel Beck:

Ms Anand: I'd like to read a further statement.

Sgt Cooper: Good. Go on.

Ms Anand: I have remembered the reason I visited Samantha Greenwood's flat on the night of 4 July. I was in possession of some property of Ms Greenwood's and wanted to return it. This property is a colourful fabric shoulder bag, decorated in a traditional African style. Ms Greenwood lent me the bag some weeks earlier, and afterwards said I could keep it.

Sgt Cooper: Thank you. Why did you want to return it, if she said you could keep it?

Ms Beck: No comment.

Sgt Cooper: And why go there so late at night? You could have given it to her the next day at work.

Ms Beck: No comment.

Sgt Crowe: Where is this bag now? For the benefit of the transcript, Ms Beck is trying to communicate with the duty solicitor.

Ms Anand: My client would like a break.

– Interview suspended –

Ms Anand: My client would like to make a further statement.

Sgt Cooper: Go on.

Ms Anand: As Ms Greenwood left the dress rehearsal, she voiced her regret at having given the bag to me. I was shocked and upset, so did not think to return it to her immediately. She left. I then wanted to return the bag as soon as possible, so took the bus to her flat. When I arrived there, we argued as per my previous statement.

Sgt Crowe: Thank you, Ms Anand. So this bag is at Ms Greenwood's flat now?

Ms Beck: No comment.

Sgt Crowe: You go to the flat to return the bag. Sam lets you in. 'Here's the bag' – you give it to her . . . then you argue and Sam ends up . . . as we all know. Is that accurate?

Ms Beck: No comment.

Sgt Crowe: There's no bag that matches this description in Sam's flat. We have officers searching your flat now. So let's wait and see.

Sgt Cooper: Meanwhile we can move on. In your original statement you say you 'panicked and ran home'. Yet you closed and locked the balcony doors after you. That's not the action of someone in a panic, is it? It's calm, calculated.

Ms Beck: No comment.

Sgt Cooper: Was it *your* suggestion you both move to the balcony? Seems strange to go out there at night.

Ms Beck: No comment.

Sgt Cooper: And you ran all the way home? Over five miles.

Ms Beck: No comment.

Extract from a later police interview with Isabel Beck:

Ms Anand: My client would like to make a further statement.

Sgt Cooper: Go ahead.

Ms Anand: While Ms Greenwood and I were talking, she suggested we move to the balcony, as her neighbours had complained about loud voices in the flat. I must have automatically closed and locked the doors afterwards. I have been running regularly for several months and ran home in a panic.

Sgt Cooper: Thank you. Do you recognise this, Ms Beck? [Ref. no. 000967] It's 'a colourful fabric shoulder bag, decorated in a traditional African style'.

Ms Beck: No comment.

Sgt Cooper: We found it hung behind your bedroom door. If you had this bag with you when you went to Samantha Greenwood's flat, then you certainly took it home again, didn't you?

Ms Beck: No comment.

Sgt Cooper: Maybe you decided to take it back after you'd killed her, but if you really wanted the bag *that* much, you'd never have gone there to return it in the first place. I don't think you went to the flat to return the bag. I think you went there to kill Ms Greenwood. You lured her out onto the balcony, where you pushed her over it to her death. Afterwards you locked up and calmly walked home.

Ms Beck: No comment.

County Police Interview Report

Extract from police interview with Martin Hayward:

Sgt Cooper: Thank you for coming in, Mr Hayward. I understand your solicitor would like to make a statement on your behalf.

Mr Allardyce: Thank you. My name is Martin Hayward and I am volunteering a statement in relation to the death of Samantha Greenwood on the night of the 4–5 July 2018. I am taking this step because Ms Greenwood and I had a public falling-out shortly before she was found dead, and I am keen to set the record straight. On the evening of 4 July I was at St Joseph's Community Hall from 6 p.m., conducting a dress rehearsal for The Fairway Players' production of *All My Sons*, for which

I am director. However, I was forced to terminate the rehearsal early, at around 9.15 p.m., because Samantha Greenwood publicly accused my wife and I of using inappropriate means to raise money for our granddaughter's life-saving brain-tumour treatment. Her accusations were inaccurate and unfounded, but they upset my wife, as well as our long-standing friends. I wanted to defuse the situation, so I cancelled the rehearsal and sent everyone home. After locking up at the hall, my wife and I arrived home at 9.45 p.m. She went to bed to read. I emailed Samantha Greenwood and Sarah-Jane MacDonald, further to the disastrous rehearsal, as well as checking on our son, James, who was with his wife at St Ann's Hospital. Their twins were born that night. I also emailed our daughter, Paige, and asked her to call my wife as she was upset. Distressed by what had happened and anxious over whether or not I had handled it well, I spent much of the night playing poker via my account with StarlightPoker. My hard drive and other devices are available to the police, if required. I understand several of The Fairway Players mentioned in passing to police officers that my granddaughter's appeal has been defrauded of £80,000 by a woman called Lydia Drake. I am pleased to put the record straight that this is untrue. It is, however, an honest misunderstanding on their part and is not a police matter.

Sgt Cooper: Thank you, Mr Allardyce. Mr Hayward, when did you discover Ms Greenwood was dead?

Mr Hayward: Friday, when Joyce Walford, who lives opposite the Greenwoods, called my wife.

County Police Interview Report

Extract from police interview with Sean Greenwood:

Sgt Cooper: Thank you for coming in, Sean.

Mr Greenwood: It's Kel.

Sgt Cooper: Why's that?

Mr Greenwood: Lots of Seans. My dad, his dad, my mum's dad, my uncle, an older half-brother – that's complicated. I've always been Kel.

Sgt Cooper: We appreciate this is a difficult time, so won't keep you long. Can you tell me when and where you last saw your wife, Samantha?

Mr Greenwood: Outside our block. I . . . we left the hall about nine, nine-thirty. Drove home. We sat in the car outside for a little bit. Then she got out and went in.

Sgt Cooper: Did you go in with her?

Mr Greenwood: No.

Sgt Cooper: Why not?

Mr Greenwood: We split up.

Sgt Crowe: You ended your relationship. When?

Mr Greenwood: Right then. She said she would go back to CAR – er, Central African Republic – as soon as she could. I drove away and . . . that was it.

Sgt Cooper: You didn't go inside to collect your clothes or . . .?

Mr Greenwood: No.

Sgt Crowe: Why not?

Mr Greenwood: Couldn't face it.

Sgt Cooper: That seems sudden.

Mr Greenwood: It wasn't.

Sgt Cooper: You worked for Médecins Sans Frontières, didn't you? Why did you come back?

Mr Greenwood: We'd seen too much.

Sgt Crowe: Violence?

Mr Greenwood: We saw monsters conspire to protect each other. You don't get over that. Sam couldn't. But she couldn't let it go, either. She came here to watch her. To see who she was. Who would do something like that. There must be something else rotten in their life. Sure enough, there was. But when I sent her a card, she said it was spiteful and vindictive. I said we're helpless. Spite is all we have left. Then the neighbours complained.

Sgt Cooper: When was this?

Mr Greenwood: Weeks ago.

Sgt Cooper: On *Wednesday* night, where did you go?

Mr Greenwood: The Travellers' Inn. Claudia. Her husband knew. He'd known for days, but didn't let on. He arranged air tickets to Portugal for him and the kids. Changed the locks, texted her from the airport when

she was at work. Said the house is on the market and they aren't coming back.

Sgt Cooper: Claudia is your girlfriend, who earlier that day attacked your wife at her place of work? For the benefit of the transcript, Mr Greenwood is nodding.

Mr Greenwood: Sam emailed Claudia's husband and told him about us. Spiteful and vindictive, huh? She doesn't know when to keep her mouth shut. Sorry. But if she hadn't said anything, she'd be alive now. You don't have to speak, do you? You can leave things be. Even if they're wrong. Even if they stink the place out. It's not your problem, or your business, or your place to put them right.

Sgt Crowe: Take a tissue . . .

Mr Greenwood: I told her: let it go. I said people don't always want to know the truth. It's too complicated or painful or whatever . . . It was my last shot at saving us. I can't go through it again. When you take a stand like that, no one else will stand with you, believe me. I told her: if she said anything, she'd never see me again. But it wasn't enough. She had to go and say it.

Sgt Crowe: Say what? What did Sam say that she shouldn't have?

Mr Greenwood: All that about the appeal.

Sgt Cooper: So she was wrong?

Mr Greenwood: Wrong? No! They're rinsing that kid's cancer for all it's worth. God only knows how much they've made, but . . . so what? So what. If people want to throw money at the Haywards, let them.

Sgt Crowe: So . . . correct me if I'm wrong. You told Samantha that night that if she spoke her mind about the appeal, you would leave the relationship. She did. So when you both arrived back at your block of flats that night, you dropped her off and drove away to be with Claudia instead.

Sgt Cooper: Mr Greenwood is nodding.

Mr Greenwood: If I'd gone in with her, she wouldn't have done it.

Sgt Crowe: Kel, can I ask how you injured your foot?

Mr Greenwood: Claudia needed clothes. Her keys didn't work. We had to break in through an upstairs window. Lost my footing. Fell off the garage roof. Woke the neighbours. Didn't get back to the motel till gone two.

Sgt Cooper: And the following day. Thursday. What did you do?

Mr Greenwood: Went to a solicitor.

Sgt Cooper: To see about a divorce?

Mr Greenwood: No. With Claudia. To find out how she could get the kids back if Michael stayed in Portugal.

Sgt Cooper: You appeared in the play for all three nights, I believe?

Mr Greenwood: Yes. For what that was worth.

Sgt Cooper: In the circumstances, if you'd felt unable to continue, they would have found someone else. Why did you go through with it?

Mr Greenwood: Didn't want to let them down. They've all worked hard. And it raises money for the kid.

County Police Interview Report

Extract from police interview with Nicolas Walford:

Sgt Cooper: Thanks for coming in, Mr Walford. You know why you're here?

Mr Walford: Yep.

Sgt Cooper: A woman was found dead across the green from your address and, under those circumstances, we speak to anyone in the vicinity with convictions for comparable crimes, just to eliminate them.

Mr Walford: I never killed anyone.

Sgt Crowe: We know . . .

Sgt Cooper: We know. But you have a conviction dating back to 2007 for ABH against your then-girlfriend . . .

Sgt Crowe: And you were acquainted with the deceased.

Mr Walford: She was in the drama group. I didn't know her.

Sgt Cooper: Amateur drama a strange hobby, isn't it?

Mr Walford: Not really.

Sgt Cooper: What I mean is, you don't strike me as a thespian, Nicolas.

Mr Walford: We do it for Mum. She says it keeps us out of trouble.

Sgt Cooper: When did you last see Samantha Greenwood?

Mr Walford: At the dress rehearsal.

Sgt Cooper: Anything unusual about her behaviour?

Mr Walford: No.

Sgt Crowe: Apparently she had a verbal altercation with Martin Hayward.
Did you see that?

Mr Walford: No.

Sgt Cooper: The rehearsal was abandoned as a result. You didn't know why?

Mr Walford: Just glad of the early night.

Sgt Cooper: What did you do when you left the church hall?

Mr Walford: Went back home. Logged on for work at midnight. Was called out just before two.

Sgt Cooper: That's right, you were at the Travellers' Inn. Why was that?

Mr Walford: Gas escape. Leak at boiler. I was there an hour. It's all on my works system.

Sgt Crowe: Your mother, Joyce, told us you saw Kel Greenwood there with a woman not his wife – the deceased – and that they looked distressed.

Mr Walford: Nah. It might have been him. I couldn't swear to it. Mum puts two and two together and makes ten.

Sgt Cooper: Did Kel see you?

Mr Walford: *If* it was him. I don't know.

Sgt Cooper: Did this person who may have been Kel say anything to you, or you to him?

Mr Walford: No.

Sgt Crowe: That'll be all for now. Thank you for your help.

Mr Walford: Pleasure.

Extract from police interview with Arnold Ballancore:

Sgt Crowe: That's a fat lip you're rocking there, Arnie. How did you get that?

Mr Ballancore: When the police came. Must've fallen or something.

Sgt Crowe: That's a shame.

Sgt Cooper: We won't keep you long. You can go back to Fowey clink in a bit.

Mr Ballancore: Thanks.

Sgt Cooper: When did you last see Samantha Greenwood?

Mr Ballancore: Can't remember. Why?

Sgt Cooper: It's very important. When did you last see Samantha Greenwood?

Mr Ballancore: Probably . . . last week. I been smoking, so . . . why?

Sgt Crowe: Sam died on Wednesday night. She fell from the balcony of her flat.

Sgt Cooper: Ah. Ok.

Sgt Crowe: [*to duty officer*] Can we have a bucket, please?

– Interview suspended –

Sgt Cooper: All right? Happy to continue?

Mr Ballancore: Uh-huh.

Sgt Cooper: You didn't know? Mr Ballancore is shaking his head.

Mr Ballancore: Kel?

Sgt Cooper: Kel is very upset, as you can imagine.

Mr Ballancore: That man. He didn't know what he had.

Sgt Crowe: When were you last at Sam's flat, Arnie?

Mr Ballancore: Walked back, took a wrong turn somewhere, but got in . . . dunno when.

Sgt Cooper: You were released from here at just after midnight on Thursday 5 July. Are you saying you walked *seven* miles back to the flat?

Mr Ballancore: Yeah.

Sgt Crowe: You've got your own key? Mr Ballancore is nodding.

Sgt Cooper: What time did you get there?

Mr Ballancore: Late. Where was Kel? Sam. Oh no. She didn't . . . to herself?

Sgt Cooper: Was Sam in the flat when you got there? Not again. Take a tissue. Arnie, concentrate and you'll help us find out what happened to her.

Mr Ballancore: Place was empty. I thought, 'They're on nights.' I lay down a while. Got my things together. Left when it was light.

Sgt Crowe: Was the flat messy when you arrived? No.

Sgt Cooper: Did you notice anything – *anything* out of the ordinary? No.

Sgt Crowe: Did you see anyone around, maybe in the car park or on the green? No.

Sgt Cooper: Were the balcony doors open or closed?

Mr Ballancore: Closed. Didn't touch 'em. Not my place. Just lay on the couch.

Sgt Cooper: And when it was light you left, even though you were on bail and had a pending court appearance for aggravated burglary? Mr Ballancore is nodding.

Mr Ballancore: Sorry.

Sgt Cooper: Someone grassed you up for that. Do you know who it was? Mr Ballancore shrugs in reply to that question.

Sgt Crowe: Arnie, did you kill Samantha Greenwood?

Mr Ballancore: What? Oh, the fuck? No! So that's where it's going. I'm not saying any more. I want the duty solicitor. Kel . . .

Sgt Crowe: [*to the duty officer*] Can you call Ms Anand, please.

Sgt Cooper: Kel? What about Kel?

Mr Ballancore: No comment.

County Police Interview Report

Extract from police interview with Isabel Beck:

Sgt Cooper: After Sam falls over the balcony, what do you do then?

Ms Beck: No comment.

Sgt Cooper: Do you look over to see where she's landed, whether she's ok or not?

Ms Beck: No comment.

Sgt Cooper: Call an ambulance?

Ms Beck: No comment.

Sgt Cooper: You do in fact call an ambulance, but almost twenty-four hours later. The following evening, 5 July, Joel and Celia Halliday drive you to Sam's flat. You want to go there you say, because you 'have

something for Kel'. They tell you he's not home, but you insist. What is it you want to give Kel?

Ms Beck: No comment.

Sgt Cooper: Or is that a lie?

Ms Beck: No comment.

Sgt Crowe: You don't have anything to give Kel, but you want to be the one to find Sam. You deserve your little moment in the spotlight, after all that planning and execution.

Ms Anand: Sergeant . . .

Ms Beck: No comment.

Charlotte

The police interview Nick Walford, but not Glen Reswick or the MacDonalds?

Femi

Notice Kel and Issy mention Sam returning to Africa on her own. It must be one of the things she told people before she died. It means Kel and Claudia have no motivation for Sam's murder. They're 'free' now anyway.

Charlotte

The bag Sam gives Issy at the ball comes out of the blue here. If Issy really does go to the flat to return it – and I think she does – then Sam must have said something earth-shattering to her after the rehearsal.

Femi

Exactly my thoughts. 'You emailed Michael D'Souza, said you were me. I don't like you, never did. Going to Africa without you. Don't want to speak to you again' – Issy says earlier the bag reminds her of Sam, so once Sam rejects her, she wants it out of her life. So what stops her handing it over?

Charlotte

We know now why Claudia attacks Sam. And why Sam describes it as 'understandable'. During the attack they exchange accusations. Claudia: 'You told Michael when I asked you not to . . .' Sam: 'It wasn't me.' Claudia doesn't believe her, and nor does Kel. It must influence his final ultimatum.

Femi

Kel sent the condolence card to Tish, telling her Dan is dead. Yet Sam is angry with him for it. Despite all Tish is guilty of, she won't do that to her. It explains why she's so angry with Issy for telling Michael about Claudia and Kel.

Charlotte

She really is 'a lady of principle'.

Femi

Tanner thinks Issy didn't enter Sam's flat that night. It could still be an attention-seeking confession.

Charlotte

Her fingerprints are found, but she sleeps there the previous Saturday night, when we know she snoops around the lounge.

Femi

And does she really run five miles home? Both Martin and Kel have credible statements, if not cast-iron alibis. Nick Walford doesn't give the police anything. But that doesn't mean he did it.

Charlotte

Arnie? He must take at least two hours to walk seven miles – and take at least one wrong turn. By the time he arrives, Sam is dead and the murderer has closed the balcony doors, locked them and gone. That places Isabel, who arrives at 10.30 p.m. or a little later, in the right place at the right time.

Femi

Sam arrives home to Andy's message. Do we think she responds to it immediately, even though her husband has just ended their relationship and driven away? We need a timeline. Give me a minute.

Charlotte

Isabel travels to Sam's flat, but doesn't go in. Confused. Distressed. She hangs around outside. Out of sight. Sends emails about everything being ok in the morning. Waits. Watches. Rides out her dark night of the soul. That's where she meets the murderer.

The murder of Samantha Greenwood

Timeline of events

In the absence of exact times, I've approximated. All based on statements and correspondence.

Wednesday 4 July 2018

Before 6 a.m. Sam leaves her flat to start the early shift. Isabel is also on the early shift. Kel is off work this week, so he's home.

After 6 a.m. Arnie is arrested by the police at the Greenwoods' flat and taken away.

At some point during the morning, Michael texts Claudia to say he's on his way to Portugal with their kids.

1.44 p.m. Claudia attacks Sam in the ward. Issy calls the police.

2.20 p.m. Police arrive at the Reswicks to take photographs of the Healing Doll.

Kel picks Sam up from the hospital and takes her home.

6 p.m. The Fairway Players arrive for dress rehearsal.

Between 6 and 9 p.m. A message is left on Sam's answering service from Andy, telling her that if she can verify something, they will have to tell someone about it.

9 p.m. Sam confronts Martin and Helen in front of the whole drama group. The rehearsal is abandoned. Sam leaves, followed by Issy, but Sam confronts Issy in the car park. Issy returns to the hall, devastated.

9.15 p.m. Sam and Kel leave the hall by car and drive to their flat.
Issy leaves the hall and catches the bus to Sam's flat.

Kevin MacDonald takes Harley home and goes to bed with a cold.

9.30 p.m. Sarah-Jane visits Emma to discuss Sam's accusations; she arrives home so late she sleeps on the sofa.

Martin and Helen arrive home; Helen is distraught and goes to bed.

Martin spends the next two hours sending emails and messages to Sam, Tish, Sarah-Jane and Paige; he claims then to play online poker for 'much of the night'.

9.45 p.m. Sam and Kel arrive at the flat. Kel drives away without going in. Sam enters and picks up Andy's message.

Olivia is taken to surgery.

10 p.m. Issy claims to arrive at Sam's flat, where she argues with Sam and accidentally pushes her off the balcony. Then Issy claims to run – or at least walk – five miles home.

10.30 p.m. James and Olivia's twins are born.

Thursday 5 July 2018

12 a.m. James announces his babies' births. Arnie is released from police custody on bail; he walks back to the Greenwoods' flat, taking at least one wrong turn. We have no confirmation of the exact time, but we are confident it is well after the event.

Issy sends emails assuring everyone Sam will be fine, didn't mean what she said and will be in the play the following night.

2 a.m. Nick sees Kel and Claudia arrive at the Travellers' Inn. They have been at Claudia's house trying to break in to collect her belongings.

4 Glen wakes Paige to tell her about her part in the play.

a.m.

5 Joyce sees Arnie leave the Greenwoods' flat.

a.m.

6 Issy arrives for her early shift.

a.m.

Kel spends the day with Claudia, consulting a solicitor.

Helen takes Poppy to the zoo, then helps Martin and Glen prepare Paige to take on Sam's role in the play.

4.30 The Haywards arrive at the hall to rehearse.

6 The other Fairway Players arrive at the hall. Kel turns up late,
p.m. limping, and is not himself.

8 Curtain up.

p.m.

11.30 Celia and Joel drive Issy to the Greenwoods' flat.

Friday 6 July 2018

12 Issy calls 999 to say she's found Sam's body and that it's been there
a.m. a whole day.

Roderick Tanner, QC

Thank you for the timeline. If you consider it alongside the final masquerade, you will, I hope, reach the same conclusion I did.

Femi

We don't have an alibi for Glen, except he's home by 4 a.m. to tell his wife she's in the play. How does he know that? Nothing points to him *not* being involved in the murder.

Charlotte

Sam dies between 11 p.m. and 4 a.m. Isabel and Arnie claim to be in the flat between those hours. Yet Arnie must arrive later, after the murderer has gone. This narrows the murder to earlier: 11 p.m.–1 a.m.

Femi

The twins are born at 10.30 p.m. That's early. Earlier than I realised. Mr Tanner, is the final person who pretends to be someone else Olivia?

Charlotte

Olivia? We haven't even heard from her. She's having a baby – two babies – by Caesarean. She's out cold.

Femi

She's probably had an epidural. By midnight she posts – as James – to announce the births. Describes herself as 'fast asleep'. James has left his phone with her at the hospital. He's at Sam's.

Charlotte

Sam doesn't call Martin to tell him about Helen – she calls James!

Femi

Yes! Why would she call Martin, after their fight at rehearsal? She suspects him of knowing about Helen. She doesn't suspect James. She trusts him. But what she has to tell him – that his mum killed his older brother and is now making his niece ill – is super-sensitive. She doesn't want to tell him on the phone. She calls him at around 10 p.m., says, 'There's something you have to know about your mother.' I think she mentions that Kel has left, that she's only just discovered this herself.

Charlotte

James is terrified. He's heard the rehearsal went badly, he knows Sam's on to them. He also knows from Isabel how dogged and tenacious Sam is. That people listen to her, that she doesn't let anything slide. He could try lies, bribery or threats, but with a child's health at stake, he knows Sam will be impossible to silence.

Femi

Once the babies are born, he enlists Olivia to help. She knows about the murder before it happens, because she has to post as James while it is taking place!

Charlotte

James drives from the hospital to Sam's flat. Arrives 11.30 p.m.– 12 a.m. She lets him in, tells him what she and Andrea have discovered. But he already knows the truth about his mum. Paige doesn't, but he does – and he must protect his family's reputation, social standing and internal cohesion.

Femi

Sam suggests they talk on the balcony, because the neighbours have complained . . . James listens to what she has to say, establishes that no one else knows and then pushes her off the balcony, calmly closes and locks the doors, makes his way back to the hospital.

Charlotte

The police look into Sam's phone records.

Femi

And James says she called to tell him she won't be in the play the following night. Outside the flat he meets Issy. She's been sitting there, in the shadows, sending emails to say Sam will be fine in the morning, that she didn't mean what she said – especially what she said to Issy. He realises she is a witness to him being at the scene of the crime, so must get her onside. He tells her what happened, convinces her *not* to call the police, carry on as normal and, ultimately, confess to the killing. But what does he promise for her, to do that?

Charlotte

He confides in her. Doesn't tell her everything – not about Helen or the appeal. Says it happened by accident. Sam suggested they move to the balcony because of the neighbours and, while they fought, she fell. Issy has never been the confidante of the alpha family before. She agrees to keep his secret. Remember the scenario she imagines with Lauren – that if they keep a secret together, they'll be friends forever? He drives her home.

Femi

James returns to the hospital, calls Martin, tells him Sam is dead. Martin calls Glen to say Paige needs to learn Sam's part. I don't think Glen knows the real reason why. It's Issy and Martin who know about the murder before the body is found. These phone records simply reflect a family telling each other the happy news of a birth. If they triangulate the phones, James's is at the hospital all night, Issy's is at Sam's flat. Does James ask Issy to find the body the next night?

Charlotte

If he wanted that, surely he would drive her there himself? They could easily explain that away as checking on a friend. No, I think once Issy comes to terms with Sam being dead, which she does very quickly because her obsession was never about Sam, only about herself, she places herself centre-stage for a taste of the spotlight. Just as she does when Claudia attacks Sam.

Femi

James can't realise Issy will take the blame. He must pin his hopes on a verdict of suicide. Why *does* she confess? Why admit to a crime you didn't commit?

Charlotte

Go back to the Lauren thing again. Issy imagines a situation in which she feels sympathy for a friend who has made a terrible mistake. A friend who will suffer horribly if she is found out. She agrees to share the blame, meaning the friend is now in debt to her. Their friendship is guaranteed. She confesses in order to guarantee her status with the alpha family.

Femi

James is a new father. He's always been supportive of Issy. Meanwhile Sam has totally rejected her. Kel has left with Claudia. Lauren doesn't exist. Give me a moment . . .

Femi

Here it is. Correct me if this is wrong, but:
Who killed Samantha Greenwood? James Hayward. In the hours before her death, she told three people three things. Issy that she no longer wants to be her friend, Kel that she's returning to Africa, James that she knows Poppy is not ill at all.
Who knew it was going to happen? Olivia Hayward. Who knew

about it before her body was discovered? Isabel Beck and Martin Hayward.

Femi

Who is erroneously imprisoned and why? Isabel Beck, because she took the blame in a misguided effort to protect the alpha family.

Three people are not who they say they are: Clive Handler, Lydia Drake, Helen Grace-Hayward.

Three masquerade as others: Sam as Issy, Issy as Sam, Olivia as James.

One does not exist at all: Lauren Malden.

Charlotte

Mr Tanner, are we close to your theory with this?

Femi

Are you having problems with WhatsApp?

Charlotte

Close the app and open it again if it freezes. You may have an old phone.

Femi

Are you still there, Mr Tanner?

Roderick Tanner, QC

This is Sandra. Mr Tanner has stepped away for a moment. He'll compose himself now and will return shortly.

Dear all,

Firstly, may I thank everyone who took the time and trouble to wish me a happy sixtieth birthday earlier this month. After so many years, Helen still manages to surprise me – this time with a trip to Hawaii, where we swam with dolphins and watched the sun set over Pearl Harbor. It was certainly a birthday to remember. We hope you too enjoyed your summer break from rehearsals.

Well, it is time to turn our thoughts to The Fairway Players' November production. After much consideration, we have decided to reflect the long, menacing nights of winter with Emlyn Williams' classic thriller *Night Must Fall*. I will direct and James will assist. This dark, nail-biting play has the benefit of a large cast with a variety of roles, so whatever your age or level of experience, do pop down on the audition nights: Sunday 9 and Monday 10 September. As ever, I ask that parents keep very young children at home. We can't expect little ones to sit still and quiet for two hours. If you need to

alternate your audition nights – mum one night, dad the next . . . – it can be arranged.

If you have any friends or family interested in joining our friendly, welcoming group, do bring them along. Helen will organise very special *après*-audition drinks and nibbles, more about which later . . .

Regarding our last production, *All My Sons*. Well, it wasn't an easy journey, but we finally reached our destination. As you know from the newspaper review, it was a resounding critical success and, with a full house all three nights, it proved a commercial winner, too. Including the profits from ticket sales, we raised just under £4,000 for Poppy's appeal, all thanks to Sarah-Jane MacDonald and her dedicated fundraising team.

That brings me to the news that, only a couple of months ago, we thought we would never have the chance to deliver. Helen and I are bursting with joy to tell you: our darling Poppy is cured! She received the 'all clear' only this week from her new doctor at Mount More. Dr Saeed Mazhar ran a series of blood and bone-marrow tests, as well as a thorough set of brain scans earlier this month. He found no trace of her tumour and no tumour markers in her blood. It is infinitely better news than we ever dared hope for.

I naturally credit the scientists who developed such effective chemotherapy. I recognise, too, the skill and dedication of the doctors who diagnose and administer such treatments on our doorsteps, free of charge, day in, day out. Others may cite the power of prayer. We know so many of our friends have held Poppy in their prayers since she was diagnosed in the spring. I thank you all. But I know Helen and Paige have a further explanation for Poppy's miraculous recovery.

At the Yogathon last June, Poppy was given a very special present: a Healing Doll from Africa. This extraordinary wood-and-rag figurine is used on that continent to counter negative energy and thus promote physical and psychological health. While Poppy was in the midst of her chemotherapy we gave little thought to the doll, we simply placed it on the shelf above her bed to watch over her at night.

It was only recently, when Dr Mazhar expressed his surprise that her cancer showed such speedy and complete remission, that we looked around for possible explanations . . . Of course it may be pure coincidence. Whatever you are prepared to believe, Poppy is back to the noisy, vibrant little girl she was this time last year, and we couldn't be prouder of, or more

thankful to, our circle of family and friends whose good wishes, help, support and positivity carried us through these challenging few months. From the bottom of our hearts, Helen and I thank you all.

There remains A Cure for Poppy, and the funds we raised for experimental drugs that she thankfully no longer requires. We have taken the decision, as a family, to donate the money to a variety of childhood cancer charities and comparable good causes, in order that other children, less fortunate than our own, may benefit. These donations have been made and the appeal closed.

We look forward to turning the page and starting anew. So, join us in a celebration of life, love and the future, in the River Room at The Grange after auditions on Sunday night, and together we will look forward to a happy, healthy and stress-free end to a challenging year.

Dear Ms Ajanlekoko,

I am a doctor based at an independent medical centre near Mongoumba in the Central African Republic. Jonathan Ngongo gave me your contact details. He says you were a close friend of Samantha Greenwood, who volunteered with your organisation for many years, and that if anyone can answer my question, it is you. In short, I was led to believe Ms Greenwood died last year, in tragic circumstances at her home in England. Yet only two weeks ago I saw her here.

It was very early in the morning. A cloud of mist hung over the Ubangi River, but I'm sure I was not mistaken. I had just unlocked the waiting-room doors prior to morning clinic and suddenly sensed someone walk right up behind me. Yet when I turned, there was no one quite so close. It was only as I adjusted my eyes to focus further afield that I noticed her, standing quite still on the opposite bank. Her face had no particular expression, but she seemed to watch me. It was as if an ice-cold veil settled over me from

head to toe. I looked aside, then looked back to confirm it had been a trick of the landscape. But no, she was still there. My eyes met hers for a long moment, until I finally had to turn away. When I glanced back again, she had gone.

At the time I was happy to explain this as a mirage, perhaps a side-effect of my malaria medication – that is, until I treated a lady here yesterday. She arrived in very poor health, having walked all the way from Boyabo, and knew nothing of anyone here. While I treated her at the roadside, she fixed her eyes on a spot over my shoulder and asked, ‘Who is the white lady?’ I glanced behind me. Nothing. ‘She’s still there,’ said the woman. I smiled and reassured her that someone was clearly looking over her. That’s when the woman gave me a very unnerving look and said: No, the white woman is watching *you*. Then she whispered ‘*sara hanga*’ several times. *Sara hanga. Sara hanga.* It means ‘Be careful’.

Ms Ajanlekoko, there are no white aid workers in this region at the moment. What’s more, the lady described Ms Greenwood exactly as I had seen her that day by the river. Was I misinformed of her death? If so, then there is something I must say to her, and I wonder if you could tell me where she is based, or at least pass on the message that I would like to speak with her?

CHARITY FRAUD GRANDAD SENTENCED

Martin Hayward, 61, of Upper Lockwood, who netted more than £200,000 in a bogus charity appeal, was jailed today (14 January) for six years.

In 2018 Mr Hayward told friends and family that his granddaughter Poppy, four, had a brain tumour and could only be cured by treatment costing £1m.

The local community donated their hard-earned cash and held fundraising events over a period of five months, all the time encouraged by Mr Hayward and his family.

In fact, the child was in good health.

As money rolled in, Mr Hayward used it to pay off debts and build a swimming pool, telling increasingly desperate lies to maintain public interest in the appeal. He even conned local medical professionals into verifying his granddaughter's illness.

'The community is devastated,' said local mother Sarah-Jane MacDonald, who claims she was duped into organising a number of events. 'We were even led to believe the little girl had gone blind, but it was all a cruel trick.'

Local band leader Tony Zuccherro contacted the *Gazette* to speak of his 'devastation' at last week's guilty verdict.

'My band and I, alongside members of the local community, gave up time and money to help a child in need. How anyone could tell lies like this is beyond belief.'

Initially, other members of Mr Hayward's family were implicated in the fraud, including his son James, 37, wife Helen,

63, and daughter Paige, 34, but those charges were dropped as Mr Hayward maintained he alone had planned the deception, and had lied to his family too.

A not-guilty plea was entered, on the grounds he was depressed and in the grip of a gambling addiction at the time of the offence.

At last week's trial, the jury did not agree.

In sentencing, Mrs Justice Limbert is quoted as saying, 'You cynically lied to those closest to you. You preyed on their kindness and pulled on their heart strings to gain as much money as possible for yourself.'

The case is linked to the death of nurse Samantha Greenwood, who fell from her apartment balcony in 2018. Isabel Beck, who worked with Ms Greenwood at St Ann's Hospital in Lockwood, pleaded guilty to murder and was sentenced to life imprisonment in January 2019. However, doubts about the safety of her conviction have been raised by her counsel, who claim to have found new evidence in correspondence not submitted at the original trial. The case is due to be heard in the court of appeal next week.

NURSE MURDER: MAN ARRESTED

A man aged 37 has been arrested on suspicion of murder following the 2018 death of nurse Samantha Greenwood.

Ms Greenwood, who fell to her death from Lower Lockwood Heights on 5 July 2018, was a nurse at St Ann's Hospital but had been due to travel abroad as a volunteer medic when she died. In a trial last year, her colleague Isabel Beck pleaded guilty to murder and was sentenced to life but following her release yesterday by the court of appeal, police arrested the man in Upper Lockwood.

Hiya Femi,

Sorry to bother you. I hope you don't mind me emailing. We didn't get a chance to speak after the hearing, but Mr Tanner pointed you out in the gallery, along with his other trainee (Charlotte?). I can't remember what he called you, but it was an 'articled' something. Anyway, it sounded very grand. I just want to say thank you for all the hard work you've done on my case. You are so clever to have worked out where everything went wrong, just from a few letters and emails. I can't imagine being that intelligent. Still, it must have been boring to read so many words – thank you again!

I hope James doesn't go to prison. He had no idea I was going to take the blame. We said everyone would assume she'd jumped. But the more I looked ahead, the more I knew it was something we couldn't leave to chance. The police are so clever now. I thought the whole thing would blow over quickly if I said I'd done it by accident. Sam and I were similar sizes, we had a disagreement – it could happen to anyone. When they started saying it was murder, not an accident, it became even more important to protect James.

He really and truly didn't mean to do it. With the twins still so young, Helen in hospital and Martin in so much trouble, James is needed at home like never before. The whole family, The Fairway Players – they all rely on him now. I didn't lie, as such. It could so easily have been me on the balcony with Sam that night. She was a very trying and provocative person and, if you ask me, that safety rail was far too low for such a height. I understand that soon afterwards they replaced the rails with Perspex sheeting on all the new flats.

I feel a bit embarrassed I've put so many people to so much trouble. I don't know how to repay you all, especially as I haven't got a job yet and still need to find permanent accommodation. Mr Tanner mentioned that developers have permission to build flats where The Grange was. Can you imagine the views! Apparently, even the Haywards' house has been repossessed and will likely be made into apartments. I'd love to live in one of them, but my social worker thinks it's best I move to a completely different area.

If I can't find a Band 4 post in a hospital, then a care home will be fine. I'm not fussy at the moment, but ideally I'd like to move where there's an active drama group. It's such a good way to meet new people and find friends. As hobbies go, the hours are long, and when you're putting on a show it can be stressful, but on the whole you meet interesting characters you wouldn't normally cross paths with. I could say the same about Colney Marsh Women's Prison, but as far as that episode is concerned, I've already put the past behind me and am concerned only with the future.

Between you and me, Femi, I'm seriously considering a complete change of career. These past few months have opened my eyes to the legal system. It seems so lofty and posh, but I met several quite normal people who made me think, 'Could I do that?' I don't mean I want to be a judge or anyone in a gown, but an assistant or a PA. I'm very organised and like helping people, so I'm sure I'd be an asset. It struck me many times during my spot of trouble that a courtroom is very like a theatre. It has a stage, an audience and actors – it's just the barristers know their lines, while the witnesses improvise. As soon as I'm settled somewhere I'll enrol on a course to get a legal secretary's certificate. Wow! Something amazing has just occurred to me. I've thought of a way I can repay you for your help with my case!

Mr Tanner said you are a 'bright, intelligent independent thinker' with a great career ahead of you. Well, I would love to gain some work experience as a legal secretary in the very near future. I could type letters for you, file things, take messages . . . I'd pay you back for all you've done for me, while I gain valuable experience for my future career. There's no need to confirm just yet, but let's keep in touch by email and, once I've started my course, I'll let you know. I'm really looking forward to meeting you finally. There's nothing as exciting as a fresh new start when the page is blank and the future is all for the making!
